Railroad Addition, the survey of which he helped to make. He also claimed that the west line of his property was almost up against the bank of the High School property. He said he had City Engineer Gidley go over it and Mr. Gidley had found this to be practically correct.

City Engineer Gidley said that this supposed street was in reality an old county road which did not run on straight lines like a street should. However, he said the road had never been vacated but just where the location was an engineer would have to determine.

Some maps or profiles of that section of the city were produced showing that Seventh street did not run through south of the bridge but that an old road angled through that part of town was produced.

Mr. Baines said that he would not pay his Hall avenue assessment until the matter was determined as it might throw a cloud on his property along where the paving was completed to.

Eugene O'Connell has a similar claim about a lot in Ferndale near the old Brewery but the council did not take any action on it.

Another question about open streets was brought up later by Councilman Savage who said that the Southern Pacific was putting fences across First and Front streets near Johnson avenue and that property owners were protesting. City Attorney Goss said that under the new state law, the putting of fences would not close thoroughfares so no action was taken about it.

Jas. Baines entered protest against the Murphy house at the corner of Golden and South Second being allowed to remain there. It was nearly burned down a few years ago. He declared it was an eye-sore and a menace and should be razed. The property now belongs to C. I. Reigard and the fire chief was instructed to notify him that it had been condemned and should be removed at once.

MARKS END OF BIG COMPANY

Final Chapter in History of Western Steel Corporation at Seattle.

(By Associated Press to Coos Bay Times.)

SEATTLE, March 19—All assets of the Western Steel Corporation were sold today to the highest bidder, the Metropolitan Trust company of New York, which bid \$720,000, this being the amount of the company's claim against the corporation for money loaned. Today's confirmation of sale by referee in bankruptcy marks the final chapter in the history of the Western Steel Corporation which was capitalized at twenty millions, asserted it possessed assets worth over thirty seven millions and promised holders of common stock dividends of twenty per cent per annum, the assets being the company's steel plant at Irondale, Washington, and lands in Washington and British Columbia said to contain timber, iron and coal.

New Sewer Work Planned
The question about the North Front street sewer was brought up but was not finally disposed of. The plan is to put in the sewer before the hard paving is put down. To sewer the street itself will require a much smaller sewer than if the sewer is later to be used as a trunk sewer for that section of town. If the larger sewer is put in, it will be more expensive and City Attorney Goss thought it was not right to have the abutting property owners compelled to pay the additional expense which will be for the benefit of property beyond. It may be that a special sewer district will be created to equitably distribute the cost.

At Date street where a "blind end" sewer will be put across Front street to prevent tearing up the paving later when it is needed, the city will pay for the small piece of work out of the general fund.

Specifications for a temporary sewer system for Broadway South of Hall avenue and the Johnson avenue district were adopted. This is to be put in by private contract by D. L. Rood and other property owners who petitioned for it.

PARDON SOUGHT FOR HENDRICKS

Hawk, Whose Story Convicted Him, Now Swears He Was Sweated Into It.

FOSSIL, Ore., March 13.—In a petition to be circulated in every county in Oregon and thereafter to be forwarded to President Taft, pardon is asked for Hamilton H. Hendricks, who in 1905 was indicted and convicted of subornation of perjury, charged to have been committed by asking Will Hawk to testify falsely regarding Hawk's homestead proof. This is an echo of the Wheeler County land fraud cases, which for weeks occupied the federal court floor in Portland during the Lewis and Clark fair days and in 1906.

The basis for the petition is a confession by Hawk, a sworn copy of which is attached to each petition, that Hendricks instead of asking him to swear falsely regarding his homestead proof in reality asked him to tell the truth. Hawk explains his alleged perjury before the grand jury by saying he was threatened with all kinds of penalties if he did not come through with testimony concerning Mr. Hendricks. The affidavit was sworn before W. H. Scott, notary public at Crawfordville, Ore.

The petition recites that legal voters of Fossil and vicinity have been unanimously in signing the petition.

Hendricks was indicted in February, 1905, convicted in August, 1906, sentenced in April, 1909. Sentence was deferred that he might testify in another case. The petition recites his good reputation and says action looking to secure the pardon was taken before Hawk signed the affidavit.

WANTS GREAT NAVY UPHELD

Winston Spencer Churchill Outlines Plans for Great Britain.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

LONDON, March 19—Winston Spencer Churchill, first lord of the admiralty, introduced today in the House of Commons the naval estimates for the coming year. The appropriation called for amounts to \$220,427,000, a decrease of \$1,585,000 from last year.

Lord Churchill accompanied the introduction with a promise of an augmentation of British naval construction to correspond with Germany's naval programme. He said he regretted the necessity of referring specifically to Germany. Churchill went on to tell of conditions under which the naval programme would be carried on in the next few years, prefacing his remarks with the statement that the two to one standard was not necessary at the present, although it possibly would become so.

"The two power standard has been extended by some of its supporters," continued Churchill, "to include the United States and by this means it has lost both good sense and reality."

The First Lord laid down a sixty per cent superiority in battleships and battle cruisers of the dreadnaught type as compared with the German navy as a convenient basis for the next four or five years. He pointed out that Great Britain at present possessed an enormous superiority in pre-dreadnaught vessels and this necessitates augmentation of the next British construction so as to meet the existing German naval law. Churchill said that it would be necessary for Great Britain to construct four and three dreadnaughts every year, alternately, for the next six years.

Secretary of the State Well Satisfied With His Visit.
