ABERDEEN FUGITIVE MURDERER KILLS DEPUTIES ON HIS TRAIL

Bodies of Coin McKenzie and A. V. Elmer Buried Near Cabin. MISSING TWO WEEKS; ANOTHER POSSE OUT

ABERDEEN, Wash., March 21.—A posse of 15 citizens started today for the mountains near Matlock to search for the bodies of Deputy Sheriff Coin McKenzie and A. V. Elmer, who were murdered while in pursuit of John Turnow, wanted for the alleged murder of Will and John Sawyer, his nephews, last September. The bodies of the deputies were found near a camp supposed to have been occupied this winter by Turnow. They were in a shallow grave and had been shot. They were found by the posse which went in search of them, no word having been received from the officers since they started on the hunt for Turnow two weeks ago. The posse which left today also will try to find some trace of Turnow. There is every reason to believe Turnow never will be captured alive. He is a crack shot and knows every nook and cranny of the mountains.

GOV. JOHNSON NOT IN RACE

California Executive Denies That He Is Active Aspirant for Vice-President.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., March 21.—"I have never spoken or communicated with Col. Roosevelt or any of the leaders of the progressive movement concerning the vice-presidency," said Governor Hiram W. Johnson today. "There was no candidacy on my part for the office. Statements in reference to the activity, candidacy or thought on my part respecting the matter are without foundation."

FOR GOV. MARSHALL Indiana Democrats Want Their Executive for President.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 21.—Instructions for Indiana's delegation to the democratic national convention to vote for Marshall for the nomination for president is one of the principal planks of the platform prepared by the resolutions committee to be submitted to the state convention which opened here today.

DR. WILEY IN CRUSADE YET

Pure Food Advocate Stirs Up Drug Men by Referring to Them as Dopers.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, appearing as a private citizen before the Pure Food board in advocacy of a regulation guarding more strictly the use and sale of opium, morphine and cocaine and other habit forming drugs arousing the anger of the other drug representatives by referring to them as "dopers." A heated argument ensued and for a moment it looked as if a riot would be struck. Dr. Wiley consented to withdraw the term "dopers" but said he would insist on calling them the "Manufacturers of poison." "For that," he added, "is what you, yourselves, are willing to have called these drugs and preparations containing them."

PROBATIONARY INDEPENDENCE

Plan to Grant the Philippines Limited Liberty After Next Year.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Representative Jones of Virginia, Chairman of the House Committee on Insular Affairs, proposed "Probationary Independence" for the Philippines from July 4, 1913 to July 4, 1921 in a bill introduced today. The bill has the approval of the Democratic members of the committee. Jones will endeavor to make the bill a part of the democratic legislative program. During the "qualified independence" the archipelago would operate under a system identical with that of the United States, the President of the United States having the right of veto over the Philippine Island laws. The right to vote will be given to those in the Philippines, who held it prior to the war of 1898 and to those who own and pay taxes on five hundred pesos worth of property, providing they can read and write. The bill would prohibit polygamy.

BAD FIRE IN JAPAN

About \$75,000 Damage Done in Naniimo Business District. (By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

NANAIMO, March 21.—Fire that began today in a Japanese neighborhood in the Masonic block spread rapidly to other business houses and did damage estimated at \$75,000.

SAYS POWERS IS CANDIDATE

Tom Coke Announces That Former Will Run for Port Commissioner.

Tom Coke today stated that A. H. Powers was going to be a candidate for port commissioner and that his nominating petitions would be placed in circulation tonight or tomorrow. Mr. Coke said that Mr. Powers had been adverse to being a candidate but finally today told him to go ahead and circulate his petitions. He stated that Mr. Powers had registered this morning enabling him to qualify, and that he would file his declaration of intention to be a candidate tomorrow. Many have been urging Mr. Powers to be a candidate and he stated soon after his return to the Bay that he would accept the position if elected providing there was some guarantee that the commission would be permitted to go ahead and improve the harbor and not be hampered by litigation such as it has been experiencing heretofore. However, since several other candidates had been announced for the place, there was some doubt as to whether Mr. Powers would make the race. Yesterday when asked about it, he intimated that he would not file as a candidate for any political office, saying he had too much private business to look after. NOTED DIAMOND THIEF ARRESTED

Federal Inspectors Take Daniel Callahan into Custody at St. Louis for Big Thefts.

(By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.) ST. LOUIS, March 21.—Daniel Callahan was arrested today by the post-office inspectors who say he is wanted for complicity in three diamond robberies amounting to \$120,000. In the robbery of a postoffice sub-station in St. Louis and other thefts. Post-office Inspector Bunsen, who made the arrest says that Callahan is being held as a leader of the gang which stole \$100,000 worth of diamonds from Mrs. Baldwin Drummond's stateroom on the Steamer Amerika in February, 1911, and which bound and gagged two men and stole \$10,000 worth of jewels from Edward Albert's store in Chicago in April, 1911, and killed a man in getting away. When Callahan was shown a photograph of himself made in the Joliet, Ill., prison, ten years ago, he admitted his identity but refused to make a statement about the jewelry robberies of which he is accused.

NOT WANTED IN CHICAGO Chicago Police Deny Knowing Anything about Callahan. (By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

CHICAGO, March 21.—The Chicago police declared today that they knew nothing about Daniel Callahan and that he is not wanted in connection with the Alberti case. The perpetrators of the Alberti robbery were arrested and tried and Albert Humphreys and Maryin Thorston were found guilty.

PLAN TO OUST COURT CLERKS

Chairman Clayton Wants Law Governing Federal Officials Changed.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—Chairman Clayton of the Judiciary Committee declared on the floor of the House today that more than twenty clerks of the federal courts of the United States were embezzlers of court funds and still retained their places because the existing law was so framed that they could not be reached. Clayton urged an amendment to the law permitting the president of the United States to remove the offending clerks.

MORROW AIDS IN LOCAL WORK

Government Adds \$500 to Sum to Be Expended in Work on the North Spit.

Engineer F. E. Lefe has just received a letter from Major Morrow announcing that the expenditure of \$500 of government funds in planting Holland grass on the North Spit has been authorized. This with the \$1,000 appropriated by the Port of Coos Bay commission makes \$1,500 that is being expended there this spring under the direction of Mr. Lefe. A force of about fifteen men is at work on the project now under Geo. Wilson at Empire. It is expected that they will plant about 150 acres this spring, the average cost of the work being about \$10 per acre. The work will be completed in May.

MORE ALASKA CLAIMS VOID

United States Land Office Cancels Applications on Three Groups.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 21.—Commissioner General of the Land Office Fred Bennett has cancelled the coal land locations in Alaska in what is known as the Mackey, Dunn and Kelley groups. The Juneau land office is sending out notices to claimants telling them of the action taken. The claims are cancelled because the applications for patents were not made within three years within the date of location as required by law. The 57 Mackey claimants were residents of Seattle at the time of the location. The Dunn claimants were residents of Spokane. The Kelley claimants live at Odessa, Wash., and Spokane.

THAW TO TRY TO GET OUT

Another Attempt to Secure Freedom of Noted Prisoner Is Expected.

FISHKILL LANDING, N. Y., Mar. 21.—A new move, looking to the liberation of Harry K. Thaw is reported at Matteawan State Hospital, where he is confined. Thaw's attorneys, it is learned, recently sent three alienists to the hospital to make an examination of their client and their report is now in the hands of his counsel. COAL MINERS IN MIDDLE WEST THREATEN TO STRIKE APRIL 1

FAIL TO END GREAT STRIKE

Efforts to Settle Mine Trouble in Great Britain Are Futile So Far.

LONDON, March 21.—The crisis over the minimum wage bill introduced in the House of Commons by Premier Asquith and the deadlock in British trade caused by the national coal strike continues. The idea appears to be gaining ground that there will be considerable delay in the passing of the measure even if it is not thrown out entirely and that the strike will be prolonged. The spread of this opinion has caused further consternation in the industrial districts of the United Kingdom where the suffering already is extreme. The total number of men out of employment is increasing daily and now it is estimated that besides the million miners on strike nearly two million of other persons have been rendered idle. Unionists under the leadership of Lord Balfour have condemned the passage of the minimum wage bill. The House of Lords possibly will take the same stand and refuse to consent to its passage. The Liberal party is now swept by storms of doubt. Some members wish the bill abandoned, others desire to accept the miners' wage schedule and an even larger faction of the party are willing to include in the bill a clause establishing a minimum of \$1.25 daily for all men employed underground and fifty cents for boys. The government, it is understood, is bound by the pledges to the various parties not to state the figures of the minimum wage in the bill. If the government accepts the amendment establishing the fixed rate of wages and inserts the figures in the bill, the mine owners, it is believed, will refuse to open the pits.

MANY HEADS BROKEN

Police Attack Strikers Who Were Beating Non-Unionists in Scotland. (By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

GLASGOW, Scotland, March 21.—Many heads were broken today in a fight at Kirkcubbin in Dumfrireshire between the striking miners and the police. The police routed the miners of whom ten were arrested. The miners were beating non-unionists when the police appeared.

DRAFT OF HOME BILL NOT DONE

Irish Leaders and English Cabinet Confer Over Details of Measure.

LONDON, March 21.—That the Home Rule bill has not yet been drafted is evident from the fact that the Irish leaders were called into consultation with the cabinet concerning the details. The meeting was secret. Later it leaked out that John Redmond and T. P. O'Connor had spent two and a half hours in Premier Asquith's official residence debating with the Premier Augustine Birrell, the Irish secretary and other members of the cabinet over the financial provisions. The difficulties are understood to be still unsolved. The House of Commons was not so crowded in years as today when Premier Asquith moved the second reading of the minimum wage bill and yielded the floor to Lord Balfour, who moved its rejection. "The country," said Balfour, "has never before been faced with a crisis such as this. We are witnessing the new, strange and portentous spectacle of a single organization, acting within legal powers threatening to paralyze the whole trade of the country." Balfour said that he recognized the earnestness of Premier Asquith's efforts but declared "there never has been a graver case of government deceiving itself and deceiving the House of Commons."

Union Issues Ultimatum to Operators Today, Effective in Ten Days.

WANT TWENTY PER CENT WAGE INCREASE Mine Owners Declare They Cannot Grant it—Over 200,000 Men Affected.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, March 21.—Ten per cent increase in wages with a shortening of hours equal to another ten per cent increase was demanded by the miners today as the only basis upon which they would continue work in the bituminous coal fields after April 1. "Call it a strike or a suspension, the 2000 miners in the bituminous fields of Western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois will not dig another lump after the first of next month on the present wage scale," said John P. White, president of the United Mine Workers of America. White said the demand was in the nature of an ultimatum. Answering the miners' demands, the operators declared that under the present earning power of the mines they could not afford to grant the increases.

TWENTY-FOUR MINERS SAVED

Many Rescued Alive From Shaft Near McCurtain, Okla., Since Yesterday.

MCCURTAIN, Okla., March 21.—Up to this afternoon, 24 men have been rescued alive from the San Bois mine which caved in yesterday after the explosion. Thirty-nine bodies were taken out. Estimates place the number still in the mine from 29 to 53.

SENT INFERNAL MACHINE

Fred Price Confesses to Endangering Judge Rosalsky's Life. (By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., March 21.—Fred Price, alias Fred Newman, arrested as a vagrant, has confessed to having sent an infernal machine to Judge Rosalsky of New York.

BADLY INJURED EARLY TODAY

W. S. Morton, North Bend Carpenter, Hurt at Standard Oil Warehouse Job.

W. S. Morton, a carpenter from North Bend, was frightfully injured in an accident at the Standard Oil Company's warehouse on North Front street this morning. Although not fatally hurt, he sustained injuries which will probably disfigure him for life. Morton was working with others tearing down a portion of the old building preparatory to erecting the new structure. A piece of scaffolding near the roof broke loose and fell. Morton did not notice it until it was almost upon him. The timber struck him across the face, crushing his nose and tearing the flesh from the bone. His lip was torn loose, being severed except at one end and other bad gashes about his face and head. Several teeth were knocked out. He was taken to Mercy hospital and it required upwards of thirty stitches to close the wounds. Morton is about fifty years old and has a family at North Bend. He was working for Contractor Horn.
