Improve Store—Norton & Hansen are putting in a balcony and adding much new shelving to their Central avenue store preparatory to increasing their wholesale trade.

Buy New Auto—D. L. Foote has purchased a new Cadillac auto which will be added to his local line for public service. It will be the latest model and one of the finest cars on the bay.

Wed in Coquille—Mrs. Pearl Heisner-Miller and E. A. Vallier, who recently came to Marshfield from San Francisco, were married at Coquille yesterday by Justice of the Peace E. G. D. Holden. The bride is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Levi Heisner. They will reside in Marshfield.

Burial Here—W. C. Deubner received word today from his son Geo. that the body of Mrs. George Deubner would be shipped from there for Coos Bay on the Steamer Washington which leaves San Francisco at 5 o'clock this afternoon. Mr. Deubner will accompany the remains. The date of the funeral will be announced later.

Reported Wed—According to reports received here, Mrs. Hansen of Bay Park who left here recently for Florida, was married recently to John Herman of Ruskin, Fla. Mrs. Hansen left here about two months ago, soon after the death of her husband who was fatally injured by a fall from an elevated walk near their Bay Park home.

No Rails Coming—Tom Coke, in charge of the preliminary work for the Terminal Railway, has been advised that the Redondo is not bringing rails for the company this trip, but probably will next week. He first planned to lay the track on North Front street, but owing to the street having to be torn up to put in a sewer, it has been decided to start construction on South Front street near the depot. Arrangements are being made to have the rails and ties dumped near the latter point, a special wharf being built for the purpose.

Get Autos—H. C. Noble of Marshfield received a new Buick touring car today and Dr. Bartie and Dr. Hol-

ister of North Bend each received a runabout.

First Day of Spring—Today is the first day of spring, this being leap year and the equinox consequently occurring on March 21.

Petitions Signed—Petitions of I. S. Smith as candidate for the republican nomination for state senator from Coos and Curry counties are being circulated today in Marshfield and North Bend. They were quickly filled and will probably be mailed for filing tomorrow.

Settle Case—An old case of John Kronholm vs. D. L. Foote over a suit of clothes which Kronholm claimed Foote lost while the latter was operating a cleaning and pressing establishment was settled today. Kronholm had a judgment, including costs of about \$52 and this was reduced to \$42 which Foote paid.

New Chinese Flags—Marshfield Chinese today are exhibiting the flags of the new Republic of China, the first of the flags arriving today. Gow Why got the first ones and was much elated over them. Instead of the Chinese dragon, the new flags are striped, the colors being yellow, white black and blue.

Gallier Candidate—Parties arriving here from Coquille state that Stephen Gallier of Bandon has announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for sheriff. O. O. Lund of Marshfield is the other candidate. Mr. Gallier was a candidate against W. W. Gage, the democrat who is seeking reelection, a few years ago and was defeated.

Pumps out Salmon—The Dredge Oregon which yesterday began pumping into the bulkheading near the Masonic Opera House is pumping out a large number of little fish which are declared to be young salmon. Evidently some of the schools of little salmon recently released from the hatchery are now in the upper Bay and are getting too near the suction. G. W. Tribbey said that he saw thousands of the little salmon, there being three sizes from two to about five inches long.
