NEW SIUSLAW CANNERY

Tallent Packing Company Will Build Plant There.

Work commenced Tuesday getting the site ready for the building of a salmon cannery on the south side of the river opposite Florence.

The Tallent Packing Co. will build a wharf 80-200 feet and put up a building 70x120 feet.

J. L. Sanborn, who has just returned from Portland, tells us that a pile driver will be in on the next trip of the Wilhelmina and that he will start immediately driving piles. He is bringing in this machine because when ready to start driving piles for the creamery over a week ago, Mr. Dessenville, in charge of the Hurd Lumber & Navigation Co.'s interests refused him the use of the pile driver to work on either the creamery or cannery.

He then tried to get the Siuslaw Boom Co.'s driver, but could not, so immediately went to Portland to secure the use of one that he is bringing in for these jobs and any other work in that line.

The Tallent Packing Co. intend to have the plant completed in time to take care of the season's fish. When the piles are driven for the cannery, Jack expects to begin on the creamery.—Florence West.
