LONDON, March 22—Premier Asquith in the House of Commons this afternoon refused to accept the miners' amendment to the minimum wage bill providing for \$1.25 and 10 cents as the daily wage of men and boys, respectively.

If the miners refuse to return to work the government must face necessity of taking those "other and different" measures foreshadowed by Premier Asquith yesterday and which he believed to mean adequate protection of those men desiring to return to work.

Despite the decision of the unions, there already is, particularly in Scotland, a steady trickling of miners back to work.

In the meantime, starvation faces the industrial population of the country. The funds of the trades unions are running low and in some places week's payment of strike benefits will be the last.

Charitable work on a huge scale being carried on in many districts. It is estimated that the miners so far have lost in wages \$26,408, besides the depletion of the union funds.
