

BLAKE WRITES ABOUT EVENT

Former Marshfield Man Tells of Ceremonies at Panama-Pacific Exposition.

Dr. J. T. McCormac has received the following self explanatory letter from Jacob M. Blake, formerly of Marshfield but now a resident of San Francisco, who was named as a special representative of Coos Bay at the ceremonies incident to selecting the Oregon site at the Panama-Pacific Exposition grounds:

San Francisco, March 19, 1912. "The Oregon First" delegation has come and gone. You have probably followed the account of its reception in our local papers and are already informed of all that happened in the way of celebration and entertainment on the part of the visitors and of the people of San Francisco as represented by the Panama-Pacific Exposition officials.

"On Thursday afternoon in company with Mr. Samuel Magness, I helped to form the mile-long procession of automobiles that took the officials and the visiting delegates through the park and the Presidio to the fair site on North Beach. Here at what would be the foot of Baker street extended, the Oregon Commission chose a plot of ground for the Oregon Building. Oregon has the honor of selecting the first site to be chosen for a state building. Immediately following this ceremony, however, Gov. Oddie and his party selected an adjoining site for the Nevada Building. Both of these buildings will have fine views overlooking the harbor and the Marin County shore.

"Friday was devoted to entertaining at separate luncheons for the men and women of the party, and a reception was given by the citizens of San Francisco at the St. Francis hotel on honor of the visitors. The program was completed with a ride about the bay on Saturday morning.

"I had the pleasure of meeting Governor West, who was induced to remain over and on Sunday morning delivered an address at the Cora Theater upon the subject of 'Penal Reform Methods.' I heard the address and I feel sure that all of the audience, and the theater was filled with the most representative citizens of both the city and state, would join with me in congratulating all the people of Oregon in having so kindly, and at the same time so practical a man at the head of its state institutions. I am sure that the people of Coos Bay are a unit in supporting the reform methods that he has instituted.

"I ask you to again thank the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce for furnishing me the opportunity to take part in this affair."

WILL PRESENT BIG PETITION

Opponents of Prize Fights Circulate Protests Widely—Appeal to Council.

It was stated today that by one of the parties circulating petitions against prize fights being allowed in Marshfield that twenty-five or so of the petitions would be circulated in various parts of the town and that all would probably be presented to the council at the next meeting. It is expected that the council will grant the petition and prevent any future fights being held here.

The scenes at the last bout Saturday night and especially the fact that women and children were admitted to it, added to the fact that many have been opposing it for some time is said to be responsible for it.

PORTLAND IS OPPOSED

Sheriff Stevens Stops Henderson-O'Brien Go at Gresham

The Portland Telegram of Tuesday printed the following: "If Danny O'Brien and Earl Henderson enter the ring at Gresham tomorrow night and attempt to pull off a fight, both will be arrested. I notified them to this effect a week ago, and this morning also notified A. J. Edwards, the manager. I shall have deputies in attendance to see that no prizefight is permitted to take place."

Thus spoke Sheriff R. L. Stevens today shortly after leaving the grand jury chamber, where he is said to have conferred with the jurors relative to the proposed "exhibition contest."

Both O'Brien, who hails from Portland, and Henderson, who is a Marshfield product, are said to be in the pink of condition, and would have entered the ring at slightly more than 133 pounds, as they were expected to make the lightweight limit at 4:30 tomorrow afternoon. A large bunch of Portland sportsmen had planned to attend the contest. Many tickets for the battle have been sold, it is asserted, but the coin will have to be returned.

Though Sheriff Stevens' intention not to permit the contest, which was to have been of 10 rounds, without a decision, was not due in any measure to the fact, it is reported that behind the proposed "exhibition" was a clever bit of politics. A hard battle was expected, and probably the ring would have been ornamented irregularly in anarchistic hue before the round limit expired, should there have been no knockout. It is reported that in such event a great hue and cry would have been raised from the stump against the present District Attorney and one candidate for Sheriff for not doing their duty and suppressing the "prizefight."

"I told the principals a week ago that they should not be permitted to pull this affair off," said Sheriff Stevens. "However, their manager, A. J. Edwards, evidently thought he could pass me, because he took the matter up with the grand jury. I heard that preparations were continuing for the fight, and newspaper notices have been recently published.

"I went before the grand jury relative to the matter this morning. What took place there I am not at liberty to say, but my subsequent act speaks for itself. I telephoned to Edwards' place and talked to his brother, telling him that if the principals entered the ring and began the fight they would be arrested. That is all there is to it. There will be deputies there to see that nothing happens, and if necessary I shall go out there myself."

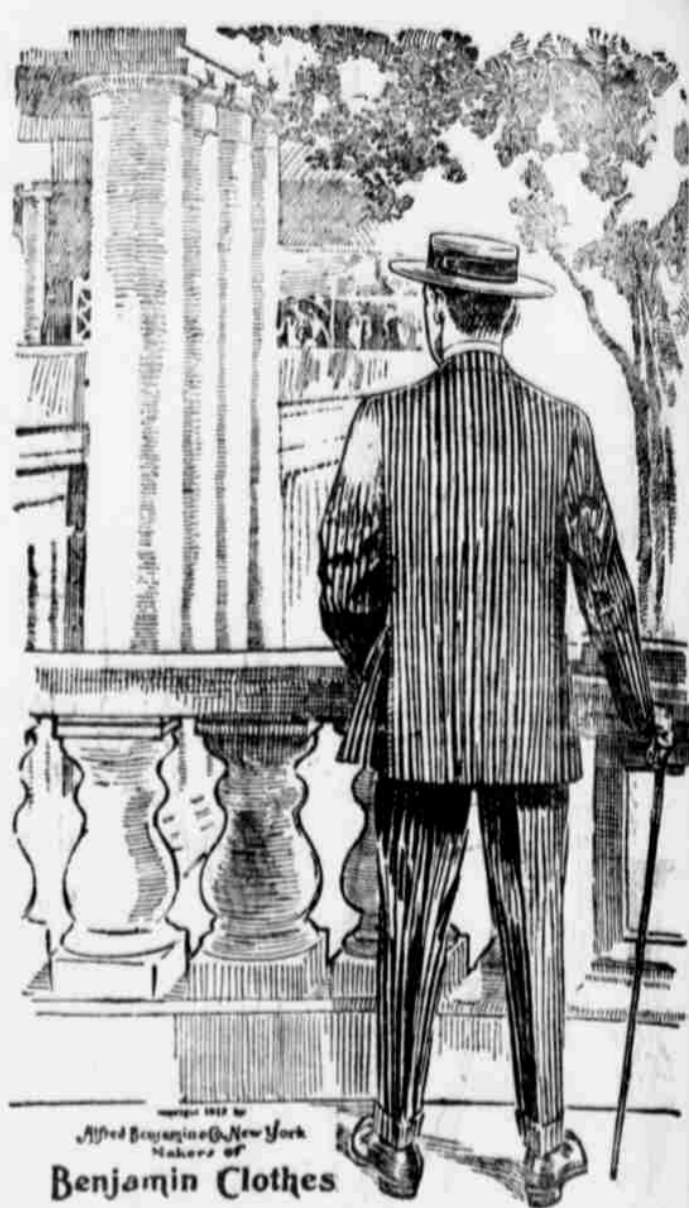
