Father Dead—Ed Busby of Bradford's barber shop yesterday received a telegram announcing the death of Mrs. Bradford's father, R. C. Moore, at Moscow, Idaho. Owing to the distance and time required to reach Moscow, Mrs. Busby will not be able to attend the funeral.

Initiate at Bandon—The degree team of the Marshfield Aerie of Eagles, accompanied by the officers and a large number of members are arranging to go to Bandon next Thursday to initiate a large class there. The candidates initiated there will be members of the Marshfield Aerie until Bandon obtains a lodge of its own which will probably be in the not distant future.

Mr. Ekblad stated that a large number of his neighbors expect to make a prospecting trip into this section about the same time.

May Fight Here—John Herron is trying to have Earl Henderson and O'Brien pull off the prize fight which was scheduled to be held at Gresham, near Portland, in Marshfield. The county authorities would not permit the bout at Gresham. Mr. Herron wants them to keep in training and come here on the next Breakwater and fight soon after their arrival. It is expected that this will bring the crusade to stop the bouts in Marshfield to a focus.

Made Money—D. A. Curry is making claim to the Coos county poultry honors. A year ago he started in the poultry business with twenty-four hens. Yesterday he figured up and found they had made exactly \$150 for him in the twelve months. Besides paying for their feed, the cost of building coops, including a \$15 fine for his failure to take out a building permit, and other expenses, he has a cash balance of \$20 and now has a flock of about 130.

Mr. Metcalf comes here from Tacoma, Wash. The Marshfield Socialists have arranged to get large audiences out for him at their hall on North Front street.
