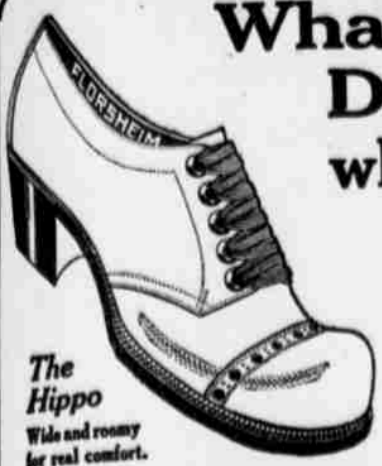

CITIZENS OF FLORENCE WANT LANE CO. SPLIT

EUGENE, Or., March 26.—Another movement to divide Lane and Douglas counties has been started at Florence and other towns along the coast. This matter was first proposed twenty years ago, but owing to the small number of inhabitants and the small amount of taxable property in that section, it was given up. Two years ago, the question was again agitated and some work done toward bringing it before the voters, but it appeared an inopportune time, because the people of Cottage Grove had already placed their "NeSmith" county scheme before the voters. With the increase of business and the rapid growth of the coast sections of the counties since that time comes the feeling that county affairs can better be managed at short range. Citizens of Florence have taken active steps to place the matter before the people at an early date, probably at the November election.

In addition to the petitions to the Marshfield city council asking that body to stop prize fighting in Marshfield, request has been made of Sheriff W. W. Gage to prevent the holding of the O'Brien-Henderson contest here next Saturday night. The requests were forwarded to Sheriff Gage today and in them it was pointed out that if Sheriff Stevens would not permit the holding of the bout in Multnomah County because it would be unlawful, it certainly would not be lawful in Coos County and Sheriff Gage should stop it. No answer has been received from him.

The petitions to the city council are being widely circulated today and scores of names are being secured. The petitions will be presented at the next meeting, it is stated.

BESSIE DOLLAR TO SAIL SOON

Big Lumber Carrier Will Leave Tomorrow for Puget Sound.

The Bessie Dollar has completed taking on a cargo of about 2,500,000 feet of lumber at the C. A. Smith mill and will probably leave this afternoon for the lower Bay and will sail early tomorrow for Puget Sound. At Puget Sound she will take on the balance of cargo of lumber for China and will also take on coal for the trip.

The loading of the Bessie Dollar has been accomplished in even better time than was anticipated. It was not expected that she would be able to sail from here until the last of the week.

Capt. B. W. Olson will pilot the Bessie Dollar down the Bay and out over the bar. Arrangements will probably be made for a tug or boat to take him off as soon as the Bessie Dollar gets to sea so that he can return here tomorrow and resume command of the Nann Smith which will reach here tomorrow from Bay Point.

It is expected that another of the Dollar vessels will be in here in the near future to load another cargo for the Orient. It is the expectancy that regular shipments of lumber will be made from here to China from now on.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT

The Nann Smith is due in tomorrow from Bay Point.

The Brooklyn arrived at Bandon today from San Francisco.

The Alliance sails this evening from Portland for Coos Bay.

The dock of the Alliance warehouse is being re-decked and strengthened.

The Breakwater will sail tomorrow morning from Portland for Coos Bay, reaching here early Thursday.

The Rustler is taking on a cargo at the Alliance dock for Gold Beach and Wedderburn. They still have considerable freight for the MacLeay estate to take from here to Rogue river. Capt. Olson says that Curry county is living considerably but politics are the center of interest, more so than the railroad situation on Coos Bay.
