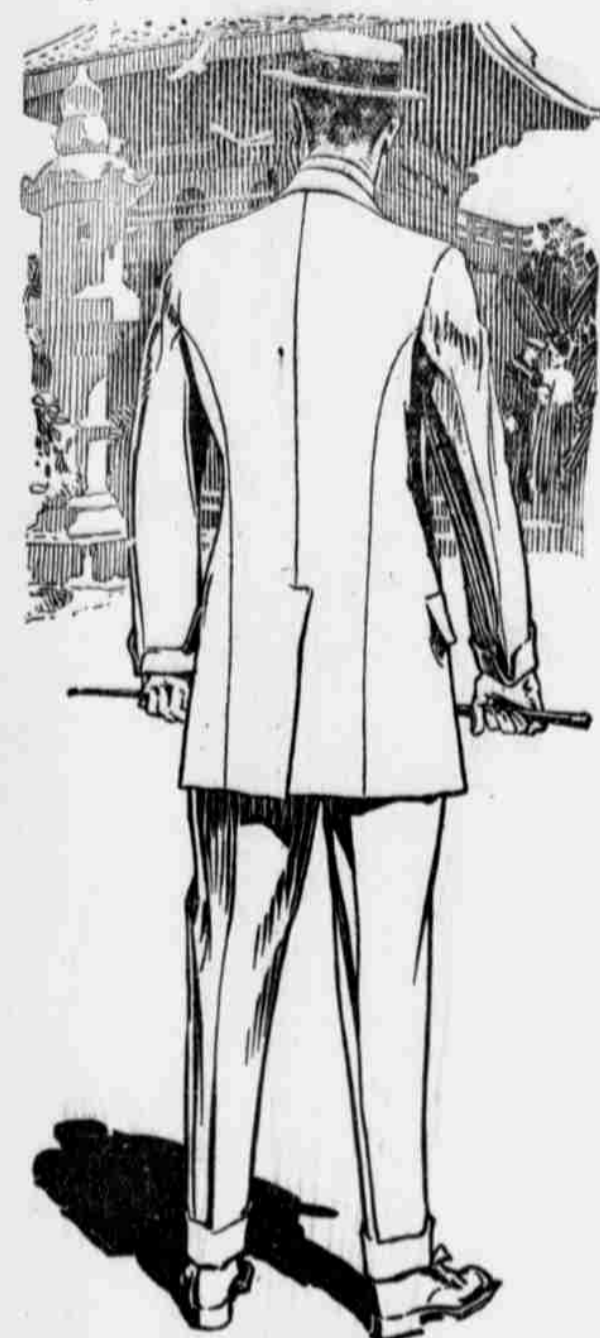

Accepts Resignation—The congregation of the Marshfield Baptist church accepted the resignation of Rev. G. LeRoy Hall as pastor, effective May 1. The trustees are instructed to take steps to secure a successor to him.

Plan Club—W. N. Ekblad and Dr. Wm. Horsfall are trying to organize a local branch of the American Federation of Motorcyclists. It requires twelve members to secure a charter and so far they have listed but ten but expect to be able to get the other two shortly.

Elks Plan—The Marshfield Lodge of Elks at its meeting Wednesday night made arrangements for the installation of the new officers at the meeting next Wednesday evening. Besides the installation, there will be initiation of candidates and a social session.

Want Longer Service—Residents of Eastside are planning to petition the county court for better ferry service. At present, the ferry Transit makes its last trip at 5:30 in the afternoon and Eastsiders claim this prevents them from attending evening amusements in Marshfield.

Rough Off Coast—As a result of the wind and rainstorm last night, the bar is reported quite rough today and the Nann Smith, Washington and Alliance are detained in the lower Bay. It is very rough off the coast and the bar was breaking pretty bad this morning.

Instructs Men—There was a fairly good turnout of the members of the Marshfield divisions of the Oregon Naval Militia at the former hall of the Redmen on North Front street last evening. Capt. Macgenn devoted most of the evening to instructing the men in seamanship.

Want New School—Residents of the district lying between South Slough and the coast, along the road from Empire to Bandon, are planning for the creation of another school district. They claim that the present school on South Slough is scarcely accessible for their children.

Gets Moosehead—W. H. Dindinger has just received a finely mounted moosehead from Unionville, Ontario. It is pronounced by those who have seen it to be one of the most beautiful specimens ever seen on Coos Bay. It is probable that it will be purchased by the Marshfield lodge of the Loyal Order of Moose for their lodge room.

Run of Herring—There is a big run of herring in the Bay now. The bulkhead in front of Ferndale acts as a sort of fishtrap for them and many have been gathering them without the aid of hook or line or net. The fish come in on the high tide and the receding tide leaves them stranded in the little pools on the mudflat where they can be picked up.

New Patent—Capt. T. J. Macgenn of the Breakwater has invented a new drag for vessels which is declared to be far superior to anything that has yet been invented. He has made application for a patent but owing to the possibility of the requirement that drags be used by all vessels being abolished, no patent has been granted yet.

Equestrians Bother—Two North Bend women who were giving an exhibition of their abilities as equestrians by fast driving through the streets of Marshfield Wednesday night endangered some pedestrians and were notified by Merchant Patrolman Chas. Doane that they had better desist. They immediately left for North Bend.

Deal Pending—The deal for the Simpson and adjoining property on South Inlet near Rocky Point is still pending. Most of it is covered by an option which will not expire until May 1. It was reported today that the Boise, Seattle and San Francisco parties who are said to be members of the syndicate negotiating for it were arranging to close at once on some of the property.

Meeting Postponed—Owing to only a few members being present, the annual meeting of the Marshfield Gun Club which was to have been held at the Chandler last evening was postponed until next Sunday. Sec. Ekblad was instructed to send out notices to all the Marshfield men who take pleasure in shooting asking them to participate in a shoot Sunday at the grounds near the race

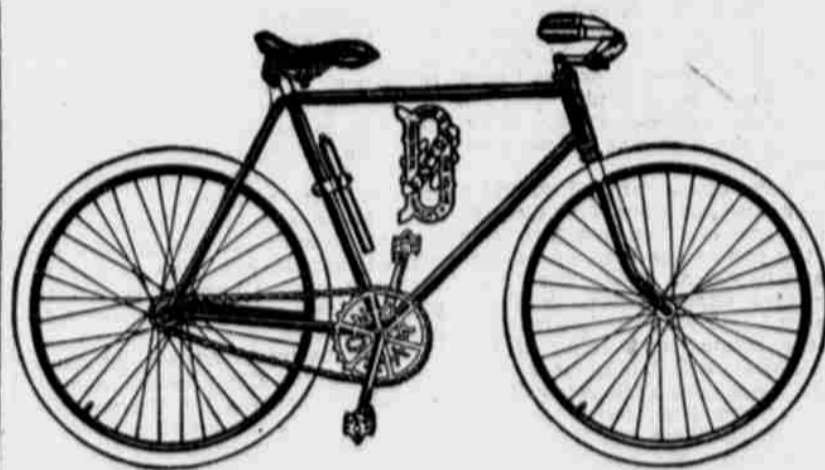

SOUPS

FLAKED PEAS

A small handful of Flaked Peas added to any soup, fifteen minutes before it is ready to serve, will greatly improve its flavor and wholesomeness.

PUREE OF FLAKED PEAS

3 cups of beef stock	1 cup Sperry Flaked Peas
1/2 cup cold water	1/2 medium onion
1 1/2 tablespoonfuls catsup	1/2 tablespoon Worcestershire
Tiny piece of garlic	Sauce
	Salt to taste.

Boil onion in stock until tender, add catsup, Worcestershire, garlic, dash of white pepper and salt; then add the flaked peas. Cook slowly 20 minutes, strain and serve with croutons. Stick onion with whole cloves.
