FLAKED PEAS

Asmall handful of Flaked Peas added to any soup, fifteen minutes before it is ready to serve, will greatly improve its flavor and wholesomeness

PUREE OF FLAKED PEAS

3 cups of beef stock 1/2 cup cold water 1 1/2 tablespoonfuls catsup Tiny piece of garlie

1 cup Sperry Flaked Peas ½ medium onion tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce Salt to taste.
