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EDUCATIONAL SAFEGUARD

T IS a reassuring disclosure which is made by the recent census regarding the decline of illiteracy in the United States. Though it may be argued that learning frequently makes a worse criminal, the fact remains that the general tendency of education is away from the lawless and degenerate.

The illiterate whites of the Appalachian mountains are an illustration of the connection between ignorance and crime. And the percentber of convicts and criminals of various sorts is always high . The United States, while generally regarded as one of the nations where education is easiest obtained is not remarkable for its low percentage of ililteracy.

In Saxony there are no illiterates and in Denmark they number only 0.2 per cent. In Germany only three persons out of every 10,000 cannot read and write. In 1900, 4.6 per cent of our native-born white population above ten years of age could not read or write. In 1910 the percentage was reduced to 3, we lines about your capital edition.


