Mingus Trustee—Dr. E. Mingus
has been named as trustee for the
Port of Coos Bay funds by the spe-
cial committee of the Marshfield
Chamber of Commerce. The Com-
mittee has secured blank valuers
which will be presented to each tax
payer in the port district. It is a
written order to the sheriff to turn
over to Dr. Mingus the port tax to be
used in harbor improvements. Very
few in the district failed to pay their
port tax and judging from expressions
around town, practically every one
will unite in the new plan to
carry on the harbor work until the
port commission can be reorganized.

Plan Approved—Dr. Geo. W. Les-
lie is in receipt of a letter from Geo.
L. White, superintendent of the Pa-
cific Coast District of the American
Baptist Publication Society, saying
that the eastern officials of the So-
ciety have approved of the plan for a
Colporteur boat for Coos Bay and vic-
inity, providing the Coos Bay mem-
bers of the Baptist church build and
equip it. The Society is to maintain
and operate the boat. About \$1500
has already been subscribed to build
and equip the boat and it is hop-
ed to raise considerably more.

RELATIVE IS HONORED

**Aunt of E. K. Jones Appointed Mem-
ber of San Francisco School Board**
E. K. Jones has just received word
of the appointment of his aunt, Miss
Sarah J. Jones, as a member of the
San Francisco school board. He is
highly elated over her advancement.
She has been a teacher in San Fran-
cisco for many years and Wm. Ford,
who formerly was engaged in busi-
ness here, was a pull in her room.
Concerning the appointment, the San
Francisco Chronicle says:

Miss Sarah J. Jones, principal of
the Agassiz School, who is affection-
ately called Sallie Jones by her
thousands of acquaintances, was ap-
pointed by Mayor Rolph as a mem-
ber of the Board of Education to
succeed the late Miss Mary Agnes
Deane. Great interest in this ap-
pointment had been shown by the
members of the school department,
and many expressions of pleasure at
his choice were given to Mayor
Rolph personally and over the tele-
phone when the announcement of
his selection was made.

In accordance with the custom
which he has established of telling
the people all about his appoint-
ments, Mayor Rolph issued the fol-
lowing statement:

"In the appointment of Miss Jones
I recognized merit and the enfran-
chisement of woman, and stated that
there was no more fitting place in
the city government for a woman
than at the head of the San Fran-
cisco School Department. Miss
Jones has devoted her life to the
cause of education. She was elected
to the school department in 1878
and is, at the present time, principal
of the largest primary school in San
Francisco, which position she has
held since 1890, or for a period of
nearly twenty-three years. Prior to
that time she was in the grammar
grades of the Franklin and Horace
Mann Grammar schools.

"Miss Jones knows thoroughly both
the work and the personnel of the
School Department, and she is great-
ly beloved by the entire Department.
For these reasons she is eminently
fitted for the position to which I
now appoint her.

"Concurrently with her appoint-
ment to the Board of Education,
Miss Jones has resigned from the
Playgrounds Commission, to which
I appointed her when taking office in
January last."
