# RAILWAY NEWS OF COOS BAY

## Summer Lines Future Will Be Known Soon—Conductors Come Here for Jobs.

Railroad rumors continue to be rife about the Bay. Of course they are all unofficial, but nevertheless they cause much speculation.

Parties arriving from Portland have brought word that the fate of the Summer projects, that the Pacific Great Western from Eugene to Florence and the Pacific Coast Line from Florence to Coos Bay, will soon be determined. The story is that the effort to revive or carry out the proposition has reached the crucial stage and that a representative of the company is now in New York conferring with the backers of the project about it. During his visit, it is stated, the question of going ahead or dropping it will be finally determined. Until word is received from him, nothing will be done.

As indicative of the outside view of the railroad situation on the Bay, the visits of two conductors off the Pacific coast extension of the Milwaukee here last week to get runs on the new Coos Bay line is cited. They said that business was rather slack on the Milwaukee and that as they had understood that trains were being run at least part way on one of the new lines to Coos Bay, they came down to try and get on the new road. Luckily neither of them threw up his job on the Milwaukee, merely taking a lay-off for the trip to Coos Bay so they will not be out anything except their expenses for the visit.

One of the men, B. F. Kramer, of Alberton, Mont., formerly worked on the Northwestern. He said that eight years ago a train master on a western division of the Northwestern had told him that Coos Bay had then been selected by Marvin Hight as the Pacific Coast terminal of the Northwestern when it was extended and consequently he placed considerable confidence in the recent stories about the Northwestern building to Coos Bay.

## BUSY NEAR EUGENE

### Southern Pacific Has Large Force at Work.

The Eugene Guard says: The Southern Pacific company has at last begun grading work on the new Coos Bay line in earnest and out in the vicinity of where the Oregon Electric track crosses the Southern Pacific right of way the dirt is flying. Fuller & Co., subcontractors, put their big elevated grader to work this morning and their 50 or 60 mules, received the other day, are used in hauling it as well as scrapers and other appliances for throwing up the earth for the grade.

The ground on the prairie is in good shape now for working, although in extremely low places it is quite wet, but no great difficulty is experienced in working it. The big grader is making rapid progress, and a mile of grade where the ground is level can be thrown up in almost no time.

It will not take many weeks to finish the grading on the prairie between Eugene and Elmira. It is probable that rails will be laid on the newly constructed grade within a short time so that the contractors may be able to transport materials and construction equipment to the front more expeditiously than with teams as at present.

Another elevated grader arrived for Fuller & Co. this morning and it is being unloaded this afternoon. It will be used on the subcontract which this firm has in addition to the grader now in use.
