SOUPS

FLAKED PEAS

A small handful of Flaked Peas added to any soup, fifteen minutes before it is ready to serve, will greatly improve its flavor and wholesomeness

PUREE OF FLAKED PEAS

2 cups of beef stock

1/2 cup cold water 1 1/2 tablespoonfuls catsup Tiny piece of garlic

1 cup Sperry Flaked Peas 1/2 medium onion 1/2 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce Salt to taste.

Boil onion in stock until tender, add catsup, Worcestershire, garlic, dash of white pepper and salt; then add the flaked peas. Cook slowly 20 minutes, strain and serve with croutons. Stick onion with whole cloves.
