

## GET CHEMICAL ENGINES HERE

there but he will receive an echo of the tributes in a more substantial form, that is in an increase of salary from \$3 per day to \$100 per month. The matter was brought up by Councilman Allen, who stated that he believed that the city was not paying its street commissioner sufficiently for the amount of work he was doing and that his salary was not in proportion to that paid other city employees. He said that everyone recognized that Mr. Lawhorne was giving the city excellent service and he thought it would be only fair if the city raised his pay to \$90 per month. He said that he not only wished to impress upon the council that it should do this in reward for the service the city was receiving, but also to prevent some one else hiring Mr. Lawhorne for another position. He said he had not talked with Mr. Lawhorne or the other city officials about it. Councilman Savage seconded the motion for the raise. Mayor Straw then spoke in praise of Mr. Lawhorne's work and said that he had been a most efficient employee and that he knew that Mr. Lawhorne saved the city a whole lot of money every month. Not only this, but he said Mr. Lawhorne put in much extra time for the city besides an eight or nine-hour day for which he never made any charge. City Attorney Goss and City Engineer Gidley paid similar tributes and suggested that \$100 per month would not be too much pay for the service Mr. Lawhorne was giving the city. Contractor Morrissey said that he thought Mr. Lawhorne was a cheap man even at \$100 per month. Mr. Cople said that he realized fully that Mr. Lawhorne was a most valuable employee and was worth more than he was now getting, but as the city's finances were being heavily drawn upon, he thought that a raise to \$90 now and another raise in the future would be all right. Councilman Ferguson offered an amendment to raise the salary to \$100 per month and Mr. Allen said that he had merely suggested \$90 and if the others thought it should be \$100, he would agree with them and withdrew his motion. This was done and Mr. Lawhorne's salary fixed at \$100 per month, commencing April 1. Some one joshingly suggested that the increase be deducted from the salary of City Inspector Tribbey or City Attorney Goss.

**County Road and Street.** City Attorney Goss reported that he and City Attorney Gidley had searched the records concerning the claim of James Baines that the county road or street between the Baines property and the high school building in South Marshfield was not properly located. He said that the field notes concerning the survey of the road had been found and that a final report could not be made until the lines were run again. He said that the road had never been vacated and was 60 feet wide. Furthermore he said that the high school property in the original deed from Merchant to the I. O. O. F. Cemetery Association had described the property as being bounded on the east by the county road. He said that the road consequently ran across the property evidently claimed by Mr. Baines as lots. He said that the council had a right to convert a county road within the city limits of the city as a street by merely passing a resolution to that effect and as soon as Mr. Gidley makes the new survey of this section, this probably will be done. Mayor Straw wanted to know if the city could open up a street and assess the cost of it to property beyond that would be benefitted. He said that Highland avenue between Broadway and Front was an example of this kind. To open it up would necessitate the buying of the E. K. Jones residence property and part of the former Marsden property. Mr. Goss said that he did not believe this could be done. He said that in Germany, cities made money out of opening new streets and boulevards by condemning a street two or three times as wide as desired and then selling the strips on either side at an advanced price. Mayor Straw said he had thought of this scheme in trying to open the boulevard from Marshfield to Tarheel Point, but he had believed the idea was original with him. Consequently, he decided he must have inherited it from his German ancestry.

### ARE READY FOR TRIAL

## STRAW VETOES 90-DAY LIMIT

with wooden blocks was estimated to be \$5046.40, exclusive of the inter-sections, the cost of the latter bringing the total up to \$6325.05. The assessment will probably be between \$6 and \$7 per front foot. The council will meet April 15 as a board of equalization. On motion of R. A. Copple, Street Commissioner Lawhorne was instructed to have the sidewalk along the west side of Second street between Commercial and Market put in. If the property owners do not do it, the work will be done by the city. Councilman Allen presented a request from Merchant Patrolman J. C. Doane for three incandescent lights to be put in along the waterfront in the rear of several saloons. It was pointed out that this was very dark and dangerous in the night time. Most of the councilmen expressed themselves in favor of granting the request and referred it to the light committee with power to act. A resolution requiring C. I. Reigard to remove the charred frame of the residence at the corner of South Second and Golden was adopted. This was merely a legal step in the direction of having it razed in case Mr. Reigard did not comply with the request made some time ago. City Engineer Gidley was empowered to have some permanent monuments erected to maintain corners established by the government survey. City Engineer Gidley wanted to know how much free surveying the council wanted him to do. He said that he had been furnishing street lines and grades for property owners for nothing, but some wanted him to survey their lots. He did not think the latter was within his duties unless the city was to be reimbursed for it. The council took the same view and adopted a resolution to that effect. Mayor Straw raised the question about designing the location of poles for the electric lighting company and the telephone company. Mr. Gidley said that he had been doing this free in order to have the poles properly located and also to prevent the poles being placed in front of entrances to homes or buildings or too near hydrants. Some thought the companies ought to pay for it as they do in some eastern cities, but the council passed it over without so stipulating. Councilman Copple, as chairman of the health committee, was instructed to go ahead and have the old garbage dump cleaned up immediately. The refuse there will be burned. The monthly bills, including the allowance of \$150 for the band and \$75 for the library, were ordered paid. The question as to what effect the new decision of the Oregon supreme court might have on Marshfield, as intimated by C. A. Sehlbrede in The Times yesterday, was brought up. City Attorney Goss said that he was not familiar with the decision, but he understood its only effect would be to prevent the merger of two incorporated cities. He said he would look it up. Street Commissioner Lawhorne was instructed to try and straighten out a misunderstanding relative to the construction of the walk along Central avenue. F. P. Norton refused to put in the walk in front of his property west of the Finnish Hall because he claimed that when the street was graded, the street in front of his property had not been graded as it should have been. The walk will be put in at once.
