THEY MOVE VERY SLOWLY

REACTIONARIES are unduly afraid of the "passing whims" of the people. They appear to think the people are easily moved to hasty action and so cannot be trusted.

There is no danger on this score. The people are not hasty enough. The people as a whole are excessively slow and temperate minded. They tolerate injustices much longer than they should.

History is full of illustrations showing that the greatest obstacle to progress has always been the indifference of those who would be most benefited by reform. People are too prone to be content and to let well enough alone. They are very patient and will seldom revolt no matter how badly they may be used.

When the mob does rise it is not because it has been given power but because power has been too long denied. It is when the natural outlets are all closed that the volcano breaks forth. There would have been no French revolution if the peasantry could have advanced gradually.

In America there is now great protest against the control of affairs by the aristocracy of wealth. There has been too much for the rich and not enough for the poor. At Lawrence the rich people who have not worked hard have reaped profits by the millions. Poor people who have worked hard all the while get wages ranging from \$6 to \$10 per week—sums upon which white people cannot live in decency. It won't suffice any longer to tell the people to work hard and to be frugal. The mill owners need that advice worse than do the workers.

There is discontent in this country because certain forces of wealth have co-operated with the politicians to prevent a proper and gradual adjustment of affairs. The people have lost confidence in professional or practical politicians and they are turning for support to the initiative and referendum, the direct primary and the recall. Since the politicians won't do what they should the people are going to act for themselves. It is very natural the people should take this course and those are unwise who oppose the move. They are objecting to the safety valve.

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SUMMONS. IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF COOS. John S. Coke and John K. Kollock plaintiffs vs. Ella Sullivan, defendant.—Summons.

To Ella Sullivan, defendant above named: IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON. You are hereby required to appear and answer or otherwise plead to the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit in the above entitled Court on or before Monday the 6th day of May, A. D., 1912; and if you fail to so appear and answer or otherwise plead to said complaint you want thereof, the plaintiffs will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in their complaint, a verified statement of which is as follows:

1st. That you, Ella Sullivan, were required to perform the conditions of your agreement to purchase stated into on the 19th day of November, A. D., 1906, by and between yourself and L. D. Kinney for John S. Coke and John K.
