In America there is now great protest against the control of affairs by the aristocracy of wealth. There has been too much for the rich and not enough for the poor. At Lawrence the rich people who have not worked hard have reaped profits by the mil-lions. Poor people who have worked hard all the while get wages ranging from \$6 to \$10 per week-sums upon which white people cannot live in decency. It won't suffice any longer to tell the people to work hard and to be frugal. The mill owners need that advice worse than do the workers.

There is discontent in this country because certain forces of wealth have co-operated with the politicians to prevent a proper and gradual adjustment of affairs. The people have lost confidence in professional or practical politicians and they are turning for support to the initiative and referendum, the direct primary and the recall. Since the politicians are going to act for themselves.

It is very natural the people should take this course and those are unwise who oppose the move. They are objecting to the safety valve
