

NEW SUIT IS STARTED NOW

they have on hand to the receiver and also makes Mr. T. M. Dimmick, County Treasurer a party defendant, and Mr. W. W. Gage, Sheriff of Coos County, a party defendant and asks that they be required to pay over the moneys in their hands to the receiver and then the plaintiff will petition the court to have it dispensed in accordance with the recommendation of the receiver, after they ascertain what the debts are. Then the two banks, one at Marshfield and the other at North Bend, who are the depositories for the dissolved corporation, are made party defendants so that they can turn over the money in their hands to the receiver and then Mr. and Mrs. Abel Adams and Mr. and Mrs. C. R. Peck, from whom the waterfront property was purchased in Bennett's Addition, are made parties so that the title to that property can be freed from any cloud under the present litigation and Dr. Mingu, trustee, is also made a party so that he will transfer whatever interest he has in the real property to the receiver also and in this way the title to the property in the future will not be questioned; otherwise it would be, as it is doubtful if the defacto corporation had authority to convey its property to a Trustee, under the Port law, and even if the Trustee had a deed to it and that was of record, it would be a cloud, but by this proceeding a cloud can be removed and the title perfected.

"The petition also asks the defacto port to state what their debts are and to whom they are indebted and what contracts they have made so that the receiver can pay the debts with the money on hand without delay as soon as an order of court can be obtained and then the Sheriff and Treasurer and the other defendants will be protected by an order of court in a proceeding where the court had jurisdiction over them, whereas, if the Supreme Court should make an order that the present Treasurer or the present Sheriff should pay over the money to any one it would be in a proceeding where the Sheriff was not a party and where the Treasurer was not a party and the Supreme Court has no jurisdiction over any body unless they get them properly into court, therefore I believe the bringing of this suit to be the proper one to pursue and if all will concur in this method of proceeding, I have the most positive assurances from my client, Thomas McGinnis, that the matter will be cleaned up speedily as possible, so far as he is concerned and that anything he does will be entirely in the interest of the public.

"This is one straight legitimate way to wind up the affairs of the dissolved Port of Coos Bay and when that is done legitimately, then let us make a new start legitimately and we will all pull together for the good of the Port of Coos Bay.

"The complaint also recommends that A. H. Powers, J. H. Flanagan and Arthur J. McKeown are suitable persons from whom the court select the Receiver. Mr. Powers having paid \$5,000.00 to keep the Dredge Oregon at work has shown more interest than any one and is thought to be the most suitable."

of which companies had been previously organized by Henry Villard. About the same time he became president of the Southern Oregon Company, then holding the Coos Bay Wagon road land grant, then in litigation. Shortly after becoming interested in the Oregon companies he visited Portland and since spent a portion of his time on the Pacific Coast, and was for a number of years engaged in the promotion of various enterprises organized for the development of Oregon, Montana and Washington. For ten years or more past he has been president of the Montana Coal & Iron company, developing the coal deposits on Bear Creek, at Washoe, Montana.

He was also affiliated with W. C. Tallant, of Astoria, in a number of salmon canneries at the mouth of the Columbia, and owned canneries at Empire city and on the Coquille river in the Coos Bay country.

One of the chief monuments to his fame in Portland, but one that will soon be blotted out, is the old steel bridge, built by the O-W. R. & N. He projected that structure and it was completed under his presidency of the O. R. & N.

Elijah Smith had no relatives in this part of the country. His body will be prepared for shipment and sent back to his old family homestead at New Bedford, where lives an unmarried sister. She wired C. A. Dolph, a life-long friend of the deceased, to see that this was done.
