A. N. W. Club Meeting—The A. N. W. Club will meet tomorrow afternoon at Ferndale. The bus will be at Sam Lando's store at 1:45 to take members to the meeting.

Court Next Monday—The adjourned term of circuit court will be convened at Coquille next Monday by Judge Coke to clear up the calendar for the regular April term which will convene April 24.

Ferry Traffic—Capt. Alex Hall reports that during the last month, the ferry Transit handled the following traffic between Marshfield and Eastside: 16 autos, 30 head of stock, 259 single teams, 44 double teams and 3523 passengers. The ferry was tied up for several days during the month for repairs.

Get Subscriptions—A. T. Haines, A. J. Mendel and Dr. J. T. McCormac made a short canvass this morning to renew the subscriptions for carrying on the work of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce. They met with good success and within a few hours had a monthly income of over \$100 pledged.

Breakwater Due Friday—The Breakwater will sail tomorrow morning from Portland for Coos Bay, according to advices received by Agent Parkhurst today. She is due in early Friday morning and will probably sail from here at 7:30 Saturday morning. The Breakwater was delayed at Portland by being put on dry dock for some minor repairs.

Causes Trouble—Many experienced grief today over their inability to secure their mail, forgetting Postmaster Curtis' announcement that the postoffice would be closed to permit improvements and alterations. The lobby will be reduced some in order to give more room for handling the mail.

SOUPS FLAKED PEAS

A small handful of Flaked Peas added to any soup, fifteen minutes before it is ready to serve, will greatly improve its flavor and wholesomeness.

PUREE OF FLAKED PEAS
3 cups of beef stock
1/2 cup cold water
1 1/2 tablespoons catsup
Tiny piece of garlic
1 cup Sperry Flaked Peas
1/2 medium onion
1/2 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce
Salt to taste.

Boil onion in stock until tender, add catsup, Worcestershire, garlic, dash of white pepper and salt; then add the flaked peas. Cook slowly 20 minutes, strain and serve with croutons. Stick onion with whole cloves.
