ALBANY WON DEBATE HERE

SECURES SOUTHERN OREGON CHAMPIONSHIP IN ORATORICAL CONTEST AT NORTH BEND LAST NIGHT.

The Albany High School debaters last evening won the Southern Oregon Championship at North Bend by a unanimous decision of the judges.

The judges were H. I. Rutledge and D. C. Greene of Marshfield and Prof. J. LeRoy Johnson of Oregon State University at Eugene.

North Bend had the negative of the question which was: "Resolved, that the system of government in Oregon would be improved by the adoption of the national cabinet plan of the executive department, allowing the governor and cabinet members to introduce and debate measures in the legislature."
