

SOUTHERN OREGON SECURES CHAMPIONSHIP IN ORATORIC-AL CONTEST AT NORTH BEND LAST NIGHT.

The Albany High School debaters last evening won the Southern Oregon Championship at North Bend by a unanimous decision of the judges. The debate was attended by the largest audience that ever gathered for an affair of the kind in North Bend. The judges were H. I. Rutledge and D. C. Greene of Marshfield and

Prof. J. LeRoy Johnson of Oregon State University at Eugene. In delivery and argument, many of the audience thought North Bend had considerably the better of it, but the rebuttal of Albany was a most masterly one and is believed to have won them the unanimous victory. George Dewey led for North Bend

with Chas. Van Zile as second speaker. Chas. Ohling led for Albany and **Irvine** Aicheson was their second speaker.

North Bend had the negative of the question which was: "Resolved, that the system of government in Oregon would be improved by the adoption of the national cabinet plan of the executive department, allowing the governor and cabinet members to in-troduce and debate measures in the legislature.

The North Bend High School orchestra rendered a number of pleas-ing selections and numbers by the North Bend High School Quartette, composed of Carl Golder, Fremont Hodson, Harry Conro and Lyle Chap-

elle, won much applause. The Albany team left for home on the Breakwater today.


