

A small handful of Flaked Peas added to any soup, fifteen minutes before it is ready to serve, will greatly improve its flavor and wholesomeness.

PUREE OF FLAKED PEAS

3 cups of beef stock 14 cup cold water

1 1/2 tablespoonfuls catsup Tiny piece of garlic

1 cup Sperry Flaked Peas 1/2 medium onlon 1/2 tablespoon Worcestershire

Salt to taste.

Boil onion in stock until tender, add catsup, Worcestershire, gar-lic, dash of white pepper and salt; then add the flaked peas. Cook slowly 20 minutes, strain and serve with croutons. Stick onion with whole cloves.
