After a lengthy discussion of the fire protection of the city, it was decided that Mayor Straw and Fire Chief Keating should appoint a committee of five to investigate the advisability of purchasia, a combined ruto truck and chemical angine for the city. stood, it would have a speed about 35 miles per hour. Fire Chief Keating also talked strongly in favor of the auto chem-ical truck. He said that the department did not want the three additional chemical engines that had been suggested. He said that the three chemicals would cost about \$2400. He said they had one chemical engine on hand now that they would be willing to turn over to Councilman Ferguson and his constituents if they wanted it. He said that it would be better for the owners of homes who favored the chemicals to buy a small extinguisher and have it ready.

Councilman Allen suggested that owing to the expense of the auto truck that it might be well to buy a team and that the team could be used for cleaning the streets.

Mr. Keating said this wouldn't do at all. In the first place, the same team could not be used by the fire department and for street cleaning purposes because when they would be wanted for a fire, they would be in a distant part of town, probably. 
