PLAN TO PUT ON VAUDEVILLE

Marshfield, Bandon, Coquille and Myrtle Point Circuit is Formed.

A meeting of the proprietors, A. J. Hartman, Foote & Wilson, H. A. Schroeder and B. R. Keller, of the Orpheum Theater, of Bandon; The Seaside, of Coquille; The Unique, of Myrtle Point, and the Orpheum, of Marshfield, respectively was held here yesterday. Arrangements were completed for placing vaudeville in all of the four towns. This circuit will be known as "The Big Four Amusement Circuit." Mr. Hartman has just returned from a trip to Portland and San Francisco, where he had gone through with the preliminary work for the circuit and his plans were considered and passed upon. Mr. Keller being instructed to secure suitable acts and arrange booking dates for the entire circuit.

It was especially urged by all exhibitors present that Mr. Keller secure only such acts as may be presented to ladies and children without fear of censure, and all were assured that if it was possible to do so, the public would shortly be in a position to witness a vaudeville and picture performance of a distinctly refined and moral nature.

Messrs. Foote & Wilson, at Coquille, are at present having an addition erected to their now attractive house and the seating capacity will be greatly increased, and the stage made deeper.

The Orpheum, in Bandon, is well known for its beauty and comfort, while the stage is large and capable of accommodating attractions of any kind whatsoever.

The Unique, in Myrtle Point, is the only picture theater in the valley town, being well located and ably conducted. While the seating capacity is not so large as the latter mentioned house, it is ample for present needs, and with high class pictures, clean vaudeville and good management, this house has a very prosperous season ahead.

The Masonic Theater has been secured for the new vaudeville circuit, and the plans for these performances will be announced in a few days. Special pictures will be shown in this house in conjunction with other novel attractions. Manager Pratt, however, will remain in charge of the larger companies and road shows, and will book them in all of the above mentioned houses.

Mr. Keller states that at present he will continue with complete picture performances at the "House of the Photoplay," and that he is contemplating extensive improvements for that house in the very near future.

I. S. SMITH'S HOME

A certain individual who has been in Coos County but a few months makes a statement that I am not a resident of Marshfield and quotes what he says is the Oregon law to prove this statement; but as he quotes a very small part of the law bearing on this subject, in order that the people may know the facts, I will quote the rest of the section, which reads as follows:

"1. The place shall be considered and held to be the residence of the person in which his habitation is fixed and to which, whenever he is absent, he has the intention of returning.

"2. A person shall not be considered or held to have lost his residence who shall leave his home and go into another state or territory or county of this state for temporary purposes only.

"3. A person shall not be considered or held to have gained a residence in any county of this state into which he shall come for temporary purposes only, without the intention of making said county his home, but with the intention of leaving the same when he shall have accomplished the business that brought him into it.

"4. If a person remove to another state, or to any of the territories with the intention of making it his permanent home, he shall be considered and held to have lost his residence in this state."

I have lived in Oregon all my life and have lived in Marshfield seven years. Have been on the election board four years. Served on the regular jury panel, last term of the circuit court. I pay \$315 taxes, aside from our store, \$122 being on personal property which is always payable where one lives. My family is away temporarily to send the children to school, but will be at home in a few weeks to remain. My children are counted and draw school money in Marshfield as this is their home. Have voted in Marshfield at every election during the last seven years and have never voted any other place. I shall not further discuss this charge which was made without any foundation.

Dear Sir: But for that part of your letter of the 11th inst., in which you by direct imputation charge me with criminality, and of being a villain, I could let this controversy end by letting the rest of your letter go unnoticed, but under the circumstances, it not only calls for a reply, but demands one.

Mr. Maloney having assumed all responsibility for the publication of the article of which I first complained, and your corroboration of his authorship of the same is satisfactory to me, and as to whether or not you have made the remarks about me to people in different parts of the county which have been reported to me, is a question of veracity between you and them.

Your understanding as to my church relationship is correct, but as to my reputation and character I leave not only to the people of my congregation, but to the people of the whole community, and am perfectly willing to be judged by them. Regarding your reference about my candidacy for the office of Governor and being defeated, let me call

your attention to the fact that my vote was about 2000 in the state, and this county was carried by me. Mr. Gettins also carried this county two years ago when he ran for Water Commissioner.

To your statement about my candidacy for the Speakership when a member of the legislature in 1895, will say that my name was presented to the republican caucus of the House at that time, and I immediately and before any vote was taken, declined in favor of Hon. C. B. Moores of Salem, who was afterwards duly elected. You were a member of that session, and you doubtless remember, that during the session I had the honor of presiding over the deliberations of the House on a number of occasions when the Speaker desired to vacate the chair, and on two occasions, and the only occasions, during the session, when the Speaker failed to be present at the opening hour, I was chosen Speaker pro tem by the House, all of which might indicate to some extent my standing in that body.

As to my being a political barnacle, let me say, that the only office I have ever held, and the only one for which I was ever a candidate before the people of Oregon, at a general election, was that of representative from Douglas County, while you have to my knowledge held the lucrative office of sheriff of Polk County, in the good old days, when the sheriff received all of the fees of the office, and in addition you were once a member of the legislature from that county, so you must be two barnacles, eh?

Now as to that slanderous part of your letter, which imputes to me the villainy portrayed in the book written by Rex Beach, to which you refer, let it be known, that this charge is wrong in every particular, and that your knowledge of the geography of Alaska, and the conditions and affairs accounted in said book exhibits a degree of ignorance which is inexcusable. Under my appointment by President McKinley, my territory was at the head of Lynn Canal, there were no mining interests worth mentioning in my whole territory, and I did not have a mining case before me during my whole official work there. Every one who has ever read the book to which you refer knows that in that book the writer, Rex Beach, undertook to describe the conditions at Nome, and the alleged rule of a few rich men over the poor individual miner, and had no reference to Southeastern Alaska at all. The Judges at Nome at the time of which Mr. Beach wrote his book, were Judge Noyes and Judge Stephens. Nome is by the shortest route of travel more than 2000 miles from Skagway, where I was located. I was never in Nome but once, and that was on Sunday, October 6, 1901, and then only while the steamer stopped over on its way out from St. Michael to Seattle, which stop lasted from about 10 o'clock in the forenoon until about 6 or 7 o'clock in the evening of the same day.

Yes, sir, I own up to owing some bills in Marshfield, but make it a practice of paying my bills, and have never repudiated a just one.

COOS COUNTY VOTERS

Some Comparative Figures on Registration Here.

The Coquille Herald says: At the closing of the registration books in the county clerk's office Saturday last 1861 republicans had registered. The registration of voters last year prior to the primary was: Republicans, 1991; Democrats, 665; Socialists 313, a few scattering, making a total of 3316. Clerk Watson predicts there will be 200 more Republicans on the roll this year than last with a corresponding increase in other political faiths, unless it be the Socialists and a few who still adhere to the 16 to 1 proposition. The total registration of voters in Coos County for 1910 was 4031, of which number 2320 were Republicans, 753 Democrats, 382 Socialists, 335 Independents, 36 Prohibition, 3 Populists, 2 non-partisan, and 200 refusing to state political designation. Taking the years 1908 and 1910 as a criterion there should be in the neighborhood of 5000 registered voters in Coos County at the close of the registration books prior to the general election this fall.
