Governor Announces Details of Policy for Port of Coos Bay.

Dr. J. T. McCormac has just received from Gov. West the details of the plan that the Governor has decided upon for handling the appointment of the commissioners for the Port of Coos Bay when the Port is reorganized. The plan was first announced in The Times a few weeks ago. It will be taken up at the next meeting of the Chamber of Com-merce and approved as it has met with the hearty approval of almost every one.

Here is the detailed plan submit-

ted by Gov. West:
1. At the same time of election for the incorporation of the Port of Coos Bay, there shall be conducted in each precinct an election of commissioners of said Port.

Any person qualified to be ap-pointed as a Commissioner of said Port may submit to the Secretary of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce petition that his name be placed up-on a "Commissioners' Ballot" to be voted at the same time as the election for the incorporation of the Port of Coos Bay; and if it appears that said petition is signed by at least fifty qualified electors of said pro-posed Port district, said person shall be considered as a candidate for ap-pointment as Commissioner of Port pointment as Commissioner of Port of Coos Bay and shall be entitled to have his name placed upon said "Commissioner's Ballott" as hereinafter provided. Each of said petitions shall be filed with said Secretary at least ten (10) days prior to the day of said election.

the day of said election. 3. All names of candidates shall be arranged upon said "Commissioner's Ballot" in alphabetical order according to the first letter of the last name of each candidate. Said hallot shall contain the heading:

"COMMISSIONER'S BALLOT"

SOUPS

A small landful of Flaked Peas added to any soup, fifteen minutes before it is ready serve, will greatly improve its flavor and wholesomeness.

PUREE OF FLAKED PEAS

3 cups of beef stock

14 cup cold water 1 1/2 tablespoonfuls catsup Tiny piece of garlic

1 cup Sperry Flaked Peas 1/2 medium onion 1/2 tablespoon Worcestershire Salt to taste.

Boil onion in stock until tender, add catsup, Worcestershire, garlic, dash of white pepper and salt; then add the flaked peas. Cook slowly 20 minutes, strain and serve with croutons. Stick onion with whole cloves.
