File Accounts—Candidates in the recent primary election are busy today making up their campaign expense accounts. The law requires that these be filed within 15 days of election and a penalty of \$25 per day is imposed every day after that on the delinquent ones.

Goss May Win—John D. Goss may be one of the ten delegates from Oregon to the democratic national committee at Baltimore next August. He only lacked a few hundred votes, according to the last returns, and these did not include Coos and Curry counties, where he received his largest vote.

Very Ill.—Mrs. Hillis Short is reported critically ill at their home in Ten Mile. She is suffering from an attack of appendicitis or an abscess. The exact nature of the illness could not be learned over the phone. She may be brought to Mercy hospital for treatment. She was resting easier at noon today.

Use Bandon Machinery.—Ray Kaufman, secretary of the Coos Bay Oil and Gas Company, has been apprised that the stockholders of the Miocene Oil and Gas Company which is drilling a well on Bear Creek have authorized the officers to turn the machinery over to the Coos Bay company when the Bear Creek well is completed. It is expected this will be in about sixty days. If oil is not struck within the 3,000 foot level is reached, the project will be given up. The Bandon people are to take stock for the cost of the machinery which will be used in sinking a well on Catching Inlet.
