

Editor Times:
Didn't you overdo the thing a little in that "Let us talk it over" about the I. W. W. in which you style them as industrial perverts and state that their plans are for pillage and plunder?
You say there is no question between these industrial disturbers and the bosses and that it is a question for the city and community. Then it would appear that there is no question at all if not between the bosses and "industrial disturbers", yet you take up the question and swat the I. W. W. one on general principles.
You have done more in this little "Let us talk it over" to create a question than either the "industrial perverts" or the other perverts. Yes, even more than a certain business man who is reported to have said that the first agitator should be hung to a pole.
A little such talk as your editorial and that of this business man goes a long way toward creating a question for contention. But say, if there is no question, why discuss the sad question? You have said too much, for we all believe there is a question between the bosses and the I. W. W. now since you have been so persistent in stating there is not, but we had not heard of it before on Coos Bay. Something must be on in the minds of your master prejudice against the I. W. W. before the question arises between them and the bosses—you must know that the

bosses are going to raise the question.
An positive that you do not know what the I. W. W. will do, for you have betrayed your ignorance all along in regard to their operations.
You say the I. W. W. represents no recognized union. Please run that thought through your mental mill once again and see if it comes out the same. You should in justice to yourself meet the I. W. W. I believe you would recognize them. The textile bosses of Massachusetts recognized them and gave them a scale of wages that amounts to from 15 to 25 per cent increase over what they got before they met.
You say there is work and welcome for all honest men who come here animated by an earnest desire to do their share in the development of this section. You are probably innocent of the fact that hundreds have walked 80 miles in the rain, mud and slush to get out of here this winter because no work could be found. Ask the people who live on the roads. Then just think of a hungry worker coming here with an animation to develop this section. If you will allow him to have sufficient wages and employment to enable him to acquire land, timber, merchandise or newspapers to sell he will suddenly possess that animation to develop this section also. Some of you newspaper men know as much about the governing laws of material interest as I do about the fancies of a millionaire. No working man, with nothing more than a roll of blankets, and an empty stomach could be expected to get animated about doing his part in developing this section. Forish the thought.
Next I note you say, "There has never been any complaint of food or wages in this statement you exhibit more ignorance than did John D. when he testified in Chicago that he didn't know whether Waters-Pierce Oil Co. belonged to him or not. Everybody else did. Same here.
Every person must know that the workers are not satisfied with their wages and never will be till they get all the wealth they produce. The place where there has never been any complaint of food or wages must be in heaven—you have misplaced it. I believe conditions are as good on the Bay as elsewhere, possibly better, but it is a common matter of knowledge that every camp is full of complaint of food and wages and hours they have to work. Go out and interview a few loggers and learn for yourself.
Next you say this menace has already been tolerated too long in Marshfield. What menace are you talking about? You have already stated there is no question between the workers and the bosses.
Is it not a fact that you and a few business men have something up your sleeves to start in the interest of the bosses and that you are trying to mold public opinion in your favor? That is the only conclusion to be deducted from your editorial and from the utterance of this "business man" who is reported to have incited lynch law for the first agitator.
A strike and a fight here will hurt everybody—most of all the business men, employers and farmers. It will hurt the workers the least because they have the least to lose and from past experiences we know that where trouble has developed into a strike the conditions and wages were poorer before than after the strike. Some carry away broken heads and some don't carry away any heads at all.
But the general result is better wages and better conditions for the strikers. When Marshfield gets an I. W. W. strike for better wages or free speech, Marshfield loses, you lose and I lose financially. The "interests" will lose and the strikers will win because they have nothing to lose.
You are taunting the bull with a red flag. Get a white one. If there is no question for goodness sake do not raise one. Free speech has not been denied in Marshfield and won't I don't believe. If not denied there will be no trouble. If Smith and Smith-Powers are getting along alright with their men or not is none of our business. Let us wait till it is.
