Postpone Concert.—Director Fenton of the Coos Bay Concert Band announced today that owing to the Masonic Opera House being engaged for another purpose Wednesday evening, it had been found necessary to postpone the band concert until next Sunday afternoon.

Clash Over Service.—Capt. J. A. O'Kelly is arranging to put on an

hourly auto service between Marshfield and North Bend and has fixed the rate of fare at 25 cents per passenger each way. He will also have his autos meet trains. The other autoists in town are incensed at O'Kelly's reduction in the fares between here and North Bend and are planning to put on a 10-minute service and hope to put him out of the game. They plan to make the same rate.

Is Found.—A Stambuck, the Coos River raacher who was bound over to the grand jury by Justice Pennock some time ago for wife beating, was indicted and fined \$25 for the offense. A divorce will probably end the couple's troubles.

Meet Tonight.—A meeting of the Marshfield Improvement Club will be held this evening at the Chamber of Commerce to discuss various phases of the work.

Gets Judgment.—Constable Cox went to North Bend this afternoon to close the store of August Hoelling unless the latter settled a judgment of \$149 which Gale Brothers of Saa Francisco recently secured against Hoelling.

Dredge Shoal.—The Larson dredge Oregon is removing the balance of the shoal opposite the Alliance warehouse. The mud has to be handled twice in order to throw it out of the channel. Rocks and chunks of coal made it unfeasible to have the suction dredge Oregon do the work.

Boat in Trouble.—Rube Brainard of North Inlet started for Marshfield last night to go to Coquille this morning. En route his engine stopped and his boat was carried up on the mud flat where he had to remain for several hours, causing his friends considerable worry.

Wed Saturday.—Chas. Conklin and Carrie Martin were married Saturday evening at the Marshfield Methodist parsonage, the Rev. H. I. Rutledge officiating. Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Conklin, relatives of the groom, were the only witnesses. They will reside on Central avenue, west. The groom is employed at the Smith mill.

Port Petitions.—John Motley Monday afternoon began circulating the petitions asking for a special election to order the reorganization of the Port of Coos Bay. Everybody is signing them. The petitions are to be presented to the Coos County Court at Coquille Wednesday and the date of the special election will then be determined.

Torrey Wins Out.—O. S. Torrey went to Coquille yesterday in response to the request of County Clerk Watson to determine the election tie between himself and Justice Pennock for the democratic nomination. Mr. Pennock did not go. Mr. Watson said the matter decided by lot, Mr. Torrey drawing the lucky card.

Umpqua Port.—Warren Reed, of Gardiner, was in Marshfield over Sunday and reports that a lively campaign is on over the proposed organization of the Port of the Umpqua. Some of the large timber owners in that section, headed by E. G. Young and company, are making a determined fight against it. A strong campaign is being made in its behalf. The election will be held next Saturday, May 4.

TEN MILE IS AGAINST PORT

Do Not Want to Be Included in Reorganized Port of Coos Bay.

Residents of Ten Mile at a recent meeting there decided to oppose being included in the Port of Coos Bay when it is reorganized. Milo Pierson was delegated to inform the parties urging the reorganization of the Port. As a result of this, it is doubtful if the county court will be asked to call a special election to submit the reorganization of the Port. Petitions for the special election were being circulated today and were being liberally signed.

A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce will probably be held this afternoon to consider the phase.

The residents of Ten Mile contend that Ten Mile Creek is a navigable stream and consequently they are not in the Coos Bay watershed. They further contend that with the coming of a railroad, they will be important enough to have a port of their own to improve the lakes and inlets and Ten Mile Creek.

TUG PICKS UP THE ADMIRAL

Norwegian Vessel In Distress Off This Coast Finally Gets Aid.

The Norwegian Steamer Admiral which was sending out distress calls the night before last was picked up by a tug late yesterday and is being towed to port. This was the information that Operator Moe was able to glean last night but the name of the tug could not be ascertained.

SOUPS

FLAKED PEAS
A small handful of Flaked Peas added to any soup, fifteen minutes before it is ready to serve, will greatly improve its flavor and wholesomeness.

PUREE OF FLAKED PEAS

3 cups of beef stock	1 cup Sperry Flaked Peas . . .
½ cup cold water	½ medium onion
1 ½ tablespoonfuls catsup	½ tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce
Tiny piece of garlic	Salt to taste.

Boil onion in stock until tender, add catsup, Worcestershire, garlic, dash of white pepper and salt; then add the flaked peas. Cook slowly 20 minutes, strain and serve with croutons. Stick onion with whole cloves.
