FOOTE TRIAL NEARS CLOSE

Expect Introduction of Evidence in Murder Case May End Today.

COQUILLE, Ore., May 2.—It is expected that the introduction of evidence in the case of W. R. Foote, on trial for the murder of Chas. Wilcox here, will be completed today.

The courtroom has been crowded with a morbid crowd. Many women have been present throughout the trial, listening to the salacious evidence given.

Mrs. Foote, wife of the accused, and their two daughters, were on the witness stand yesterday and told of Wilcox's revolting crimes against the girls.

The defense is trying to show that Foote was suffering from mental aberration when he shot Wilcox. Dr. Mings, of Marshfield, who was one of the expert witnesses, refused to say that he thought Foote was suffering from insanity. He said that Foote was suffering from a senile condition, but he would not state that Foote was insane at the time of the shooting. By members of the Foote family and others, the defense is trying to show that after the emotions he evinced after the discovery of Wilcox's crime against his family Foote was so highly wrought up that he was temporarily insane.

G. W. Kaufman, J. W. Hildebrand and F. A. Golden, of Marshfield, are members of the jury which will decide Foote's fate.
