PLANS FOR ATHLETIC CONTESTS HERE BETWEEN SEVERAL HIGH SCHOOLS PRACTICALLY COMPLETED.

Plans for the high school track meet are being rapidly perfected and it is expected that this year's field day will be the biggest and best, as well as the most joyous one ever held here.

The athletic association of the Marshfield high school will give a gold medal to the best all-around athlete in the county, a silver medal to the second best, and ribbons for the first, second and third places in each event.

The school children have started a ticket selling campaign and expect to sell a thousand tickets before Friday, May 10, which is to be a half holiday.

During the wet weather training has been indoor, but good progress has been made nevertheless. Reports from the other schools in the county are very encouraging and to the effect that all are confident of winning.

The judges have been practically all chosen and care has been taken to secure men who understand athletics and will run off the events quickly.

Preparations are now being made for a social time to be given after the meet.

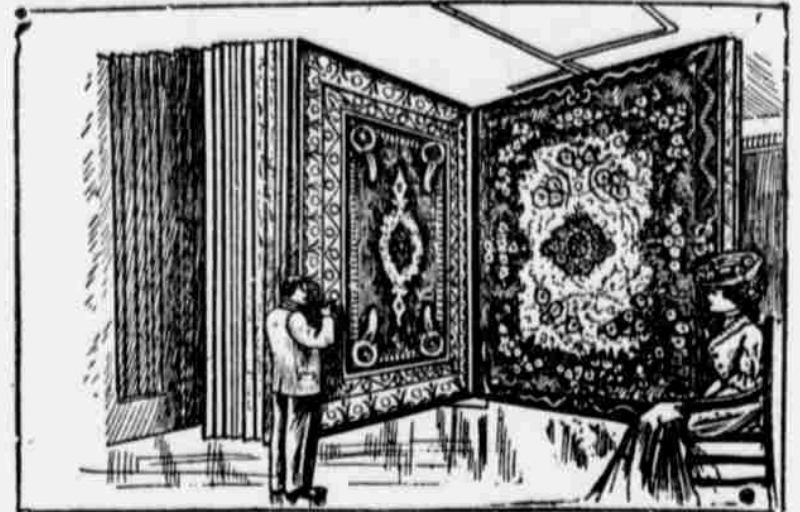
