**DIES AT NORTH BEND**

**John W. Carlson Succumbs to Tuberculosis After Long Illness.**

John W. Carlson, formerly yard boss at the North Bend Sash & Door factory, died yesterday afternoon at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl J. Carlson, near Mercy hospital, after a lingering illness of tuberculosis. He first became afflicted about two years ago and went to Redlands, Calif., where he spent a year or more without gaining relief. He returned to the Bay and since last July had been bedfast. He is survived by his parents and several brothers and sisters. The funeral will be held from the North Bend Presbyterian church Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Mr. Carlson was an active worker in the North Bend Presbyterian church and Christian Endeavor. He came here with his parents several years ago from Texas. His eldest sister, Mrs. Annie Erickson, is critically ill of tuberculosis in Texas.
