Mill Closed.—The C. A. Smith company's big mill is closed down today on account of a breakdown in the power plant.

Bad Checks.—Marshal J. W. Carter is today investigating an effort of some unknown parties to pass worthless checks about town. No arrests have been made.

Leaves Bay—Goldie Bestcott who was recently acquitted on the charge of murdering Charles Murray is reported to have gone to San Francisco. She has relatives there and may dispose of her property in this section and remain there.

After Property.—F. A. Warner, of the C. A. Smith company, is reported to be negotiating for the purchase of a large tract of land on Isthmus Inlet. Mr. Warner is now in San Francisco, and according to reports, will close the deal on his return here soon.

Plan Fight—John Herron has received word that Frank Street, a Chelalis pugilist, will reach here in a few days to meet Jess Day. The fight will probably be a twenty round go and it is expected that it will be pulled off a week from tonight.

Start Pulp Mill.—The driving of piling for the foundation of the new pulp mill which the C. A. Smith Co. will build on Isthmus Inlet just south of the big lumber mill, will be started next Monday. Messrs. Nordrum who are to have charge of the pulp mill leave in a few weeks for the east to order the machinery and it is hoped to have the plant in operation in less than six months.

Plan for League—At a conference of R. T. Whitty of Eastside, J. C. Wallace of North Bend and Joe Schott of Marshfield here, it was decided to call a meeting of the Coos county baseball team representatives at Coquille next Saturday to organize

the Coos County League and arrange a schedule for the season.

Is Re-elected.—The Marshfield school board today reelected Mrs. Mary Thompson, a teacher in the grades at the South Marshfield building at the increased salary of \$65 per month. The board met to consider bids on plumbing in the Central building and the awarding of the contract was postponed until next Friday.

Engineer Here.—Engineer Thompson has been here for the past week going over the plant of the Coos Bay Water Company to make a report on it. The option of Messrs. Nolan and Jackson was understood to expire May 1. Messrs. Bennett and Flanagan left today for Portland and it is understood that their trip is on matters pertaining to the deal.

Market Closed.—Constable Cox today closed the Sanitary Meat Market on North Front street, and placed J. W. Watt in charge. The market was closed to satisfy a judgment of about \$50 which D. W. Small obtained in Justice Pennock's court some time ago against W. B. Rohrer, the proprietor. Mr. Rohrer is expected here tonight from Coquille to adjust the matter.

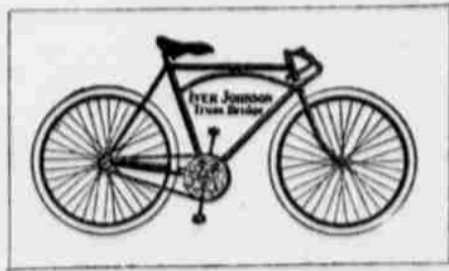

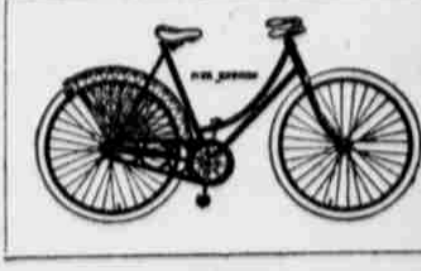
