Destroying Records Denied by Court in New Jersey.

TRENTON, May 9 .- The appeal in the United States district court here for an injunction to restrain the United States Steel corporation and a number of its subsidiary concerns from destroying books and papers which might be used in evidence in a suit of the government for dissolution of the steel corporation was filed this morning by Judges Gray, to the American Steel and Wire Co., one of the steel corporation's subsidiary concerns.

The opinion says that no evidence was offered that such a destruction was threatened and that while certain papers in case of the American Steel and Wire company had been destroyed after the government had returned the papers to the possession of the company, it was not shown that the other companies were in any respect connected with its acts and that without this evidence the court cannot grant the petition.
