Pay Bonds.—The Marshfield school board today instructed Clerk John F. Hall to pay off \$1500 of the \$15,000 bond issue of 1895 which was floated to erect the Central school building. This leaves only \$4000 of this issue outstanding.

Will Celebrate.—May 17, the anniversary of the freedom of Norway, will be celebrated by the Norwegian residents of Coos Bay. The Young People's Society of the Norwegian Lutheran church will give a program at the Finnish Hall on the evening of May 17.

Girl Sent Away.—Clara Weber of Curry county was sent to the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society at Portland today by an order of Judge Hall in the juvenile court. She is 15 years old and her family formerly lived at Newport and Riverton before going to Curry county.

Curry Decoration Day.—Baker Post G. A. R. is taking steps for the annual observance of Memorial Day. S. B. Cathcart, Lee Webster and I. S. Kaufman have been appointed a committee to confer with D. A. Jones, E. H. Joehnk and F. K. Gettins, representing the Spanish-American War Veterans, relative to the program.

Build Foundry.—H. J. Kimball has wired W. S. Turpen from Portland to go ahead with the plans for building a structure 50 x 75 feet to be used as a machine shop and foundry on North Front street. It will be located near the Holland boat shop. Mr. Kimball will also have the residence at the corner of Fourth and Commercial remodeled as a home as he plans to move his family here soon.

Waterworks Deal.—It is understood that a conference between J. H. Flanagan and J. W. Bennett and representative of T. J. Nolan, Mr. Nye, and the balance of the Omaha syndicate which has been negotiating for the purchase of the Coos Bay Water Company will be held in Portland today. Unless something unexpected occurs, the deal will probably go through and the plant turned over at an early date.

Get Contract.—The Marshfield school board today awarded the contract for the new plumbing in the Central school building to Willey & Schroeder Co., the lowest bidder. Bids on changes in the work as specified were thrown out.
