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IMPROVEMENT OF NEW YORK HARBOR

THERE'S a lesson and a suggestion for Coos Bay in the action of New York in its active and thorough work to secure congressional aid for improvement of its harbor.

Recommendations for the improvement of the harbor of New York, made in a report submitted to the war department by Col. W. H. Black, engineer in charge of that port, says an exchange, have been transmitted to Congress by Secretary Stimson and are now before the House committee on rivers and harbors.

It is shown in the present instance that increased depth in the Hudson is demanded in order to meet the requirements of the large transatlantic passenger vessels that ply as far as Twenty-third street and the large freight carriers that go higher than that point.

These details are worthy of consideration, because they may serve to show other ports that are looking forward to increased business how thoroughly and sweepingly New York goes about its harbor affairs.

BAR SHIPMENT OF INTOXICANTS

ty feet, six and one-half inches and breaking a former record of eighteen feet, four inches, made by Ed Wieder, of Marshfield.

Many Close Contests.

The meet was hotly contested throughout and until the last two events the result was always in doubt.

The first event, the 100-yard dash, was won by Hodson, of North Bend, by a margin of about a yard. Gallier, of Bandon, beat out Larson, of Marshfield, for second place by a bare six inches.

Sidney Clarke, of Marshfield, took the next event, the high jump, easily defeating Laird, of Bandon, and Hodson, of North Bend, both of whom failed on the five feet five line.

The half mile run was a walk-away for Marshfield, Larson winning by several yards without effort. In this Larson trailed along near the rear until the quarter mile was passed when he forged ahead and soon took the lead which he easily maintained. Laird, of Bandon, also had an easy time for second place, and Custer, of Coquille, had little competition for third.

The quarter mile was hotly contested from start to finish between Bowman, of Bandon, and Stutsman, of Marshfield, the former finally forging ahead and leading at the tape by about a yard.

Laird, of Bandon, easily won the pole vault, with Dewey, of North Bend, taking second honors with nine feet three inches. Sidney Clarke, of Marshfield, and Hanson, of North Bend, tied for third place with nine feet.

Marshfield took both first and second honors in the 220-yard dash, Larson and S. Clarke finishing in the order named.

North Bend had it all its own way in the shot-put, taking all three places and having their competitor completely outclassed in this event. The 220-yard low hurdles was run in two heats, Larson and Stutsman, of Marshfield, taking first and second places in the first, and Van Zile taking first place in the second heat. The time of Stutsman, however, was faster than that of Van Zile, so North Bend got only third place.

In the standing broad jump, Laird of Bandon, defeated Larson, of Marshfield, for first place by one and a half inches.

In the relay race, Marshfield had a walkover. Harrington taking the lead at the start which was maintained by his teammates to the finish, Larson finishing a good 30 yards ahead.

REV HALL TO HAVE CHARGE

Former Marshfield Pastor Recommended for Colporter Work Appointment.

Rev. G. LeRoy Hall, who recently retired as pastor of the Marshfield Baptist church, has been recommended to assume charge of the colporter work of that denomination in the Pacific Northwest. He has signified his intention of accepting the appointment.

Rev. F. C. W. Parker who recently visited here has written that he has recommended Rev. Hall to the Oregon State Board of the Baptist Publication Society for the position. Rev. Hall's principal duties in the new position will be to assume charge of the Colporter boat which is to be built here and which is to serve the points in this district which are remote from a church.

In order to assume the new position, Rev. Hall has decided not to accept a call from another leading Baptist church in Oregon although the Colporter work does not pay within several hundred dollars as much salary as the church pastorate would. Rev. Hall says that he has become deeply interested in this field and in the proposed work and feels that he should make some sacrifice in order to aid in its development.
