

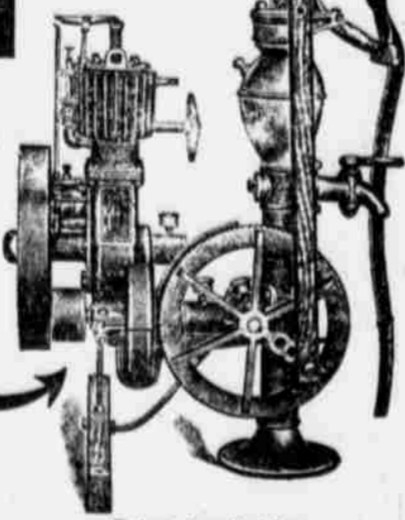

Mrs. Torrey was married about four years ago and is survived by a 2-year-old son and an infant only a few days old. Her mother, Mrs. B. Marshall, was with her at the time. Five sisters and two brothers also survive, one of the brothers being Dick Marshall, of the Coos Bay Grocery company, at North Bend.
