

HOT WEATHER FOR MAY DAY

Government Thermometer Registered 75 Sunday—Heat Intense.

It wasn't so hot yesterday after all. The government thermometer only registered 75 as the maximum temperature during the day and that was about 5 o'clock last evening. Up to late in the afternoon 73 was the warmest registered.

There were more complaints about the heat yesterday than have been heard in a long time, even during last summer. This was probably due to the fact that there was little wind in evidence yesterday, the northwest wind which generally brings complaint, being almost a minus quantity.

Some claimed that the thermometers registered above 80 in the sun along about mid-day. Many launche and auto parties were organized to find relief from the heat.

Last year, 79 was the maximum registered during the summer and many claim that it did not seem any warmer than yesterday.

Saturday the warmest shown by the government thermometer was 63.

FRANCHISE TO BE TAKEN UP

North Bend Citizens May Ask Council to Insert "Common User" Clause.

The North Bend city council will meet tomorrow night and according to rumors afloat today, the session may prove a lively one.

It is too soon for the council to take final action on the Southern Pacific franchise, a month not having elapsed since it was first read, but it is claimed that some North Bend parties will appear and urge the insertion of a "Common User" clause in it.

The Southern Pacific has been opposed to a "Common User" clause there and are especially opposed to the suggestion that the "common user" regulation apply to all of their right of way in North Bend. It is claimed that about two-thirds of the right of way of the Southern Pacific in North Bend is across private property which the company has bought.

Cities Work Together. Councilman P. E. Allen of Marshfield was in North Bend Saturday and conferred with a number of people there. He said that he found many there who favored the idea of C. A. Smith—that the same kind of a franchise should be granted the Southern Pacific in Marshfield and North Bend.

It is likely that the North Bend and Marshfield city councils will hold a conference about the matter very soon.

Meet Wednesday Night. The Marshfield city council meets Wednesday night to take up the Southern Pacific franchise.

There has been little or no change in the situation since Saturday. It is understood that another conference will be held with C. J. Mills to see if the matter cannot be adjusted between the Southern Pacific and Terminal Railway so that final action can be taken on it Wednesday night.

BETTER ROADS FAVORED HERE

Coos Bay Co-operates in Movement—Local Projects Taken Up.

At a meeting at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce Saturday afternoon, it was decided to co-operate in the movement with the other commercial bodies of the state to secure good roads legislation.

There are six different initiative measures pending and it was decided to have John Motley, acting secretary, circulate them here and get Coos Bay's quota of the signatures necessary to secure their submission to the voters.

Judge Coke, chairman of the Good Roads committee of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, talked on local highway projects. It was decided that the organization should do all it can to forward the project for a water-level road from Eastside to Sumner.

It was stated that petitions for this highway, which will be constructed along the bank or Catching Inlet by dredgings from the channel will be presented to the county court this fall.

The project of securing a highway from Marshfield to the lighthouse that can be traversed by autos at any season of the year was also taken up and something definite will be done along this line soon.
