NOBLE VICTIM OF PUGILISTS

Local Man Injured In Free-for-All With Jesse Day and Sing Hosan.

Jesse Day, the prize fighter, will be tried before Recorder Butler tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock on a charge of assault and battery as a result of his trying to show his pugilistic proclivities yesterday afternoon. According to eye-witnesses he would have got decidedly the worst of it had it not been that he got Dick Noble's finger in his mouth and started to chew it. This may result in Day being taken before the grand jury on the charge of mayhem.

It seems that Dick Noble and several including Sing Hosan, the Beaver Hill Chinese pugilist, were playing cards at Matt's billiard hall yesterday afternoon. The Chinaman made some remarks about Noble and the latter retorted hotly. Thereupon, it is claimed, Day jumped over and hit Noble, knocking the latter down and kicking him. Noble was quickly on his feet and rushed in on Day and threw the latter down. He had him at his mercy, it is claimed, when Day started chewing his finger. Then they were separated. The Chinaman then made some remark and Noble rushed at him. The Chinaman ducked and made a hasty exit. Noble struck the window and cut his hand severely. Several stitches were required. His finger is said to have been badly lacerated by Day's teeth.

The sympathy of the crowd, according to talk today, is entirely with Mr. Noble in the matter and many claim that he would have "cleaned" either or possibly both of the pugilists in the rough and tumble.
