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Roosevelt, Taft and La Follette Making Whirlwind Finish Today.

Taft Hits Roosevelt HARD IN HIS SPEECH

Roosevelt Declares That There Will Be No Compromise and He Will Win.

ROOSEVELT DECLARES THAT HE WILL WIN (By Associated Press.) CAMBRIDGE, Ohio, May 20.—Col. Roosevelt served notice today that he would resist any compromise in the republican national convention.

"There can be no compromise," he said. "Some of our opponents are saying that neither Taft nor I should be nominated. I'll name the compromise candidate. He will be me."

HAMILTON, Ohio, May 20.—President Taft today developed new lines to criticize Col. Roosevelt. His speech here he made a hot answer to Roosevelt's charge that he had abolished many important "commissions," appointed in the last administration by making a counter charge that these commissions frequently had been unlawfully appointed.

Taft added to his statement that Roosevelt evidently thought he was the republican party. It was a speech that handled the former president without gloves and the crowd broke in several times with cheers of applause.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, May 20.—President Taft started the last day of his Ohio campaign this morning, greatly refreshed by a day and night rest in Cincinnati. The President's schedule for today called for visits in four Ohio congressional districts and more than ten speeches. He will return to Cincinnati to spend the night at the home of his brother and after voting tomorrow will leave for Washington.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 20.—Col. Roosevelt will bring his campaign for votes in the Ohio primary to a close tonight. His last stop will be at Donnell and thence he goes to Oyster Bay to await the news of the election which it is said may decide whether he or Taft will be chosen by the convention in Chicago as the candidate of the republican party for the presidency.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 20.—The schedule of Senator La Follette for today embraces Medina and Painesville and near-by towns at which he was to speak before making his closing appeal as presidential aspirant to Cleveland voters tonight.

PLAN FOR CONVENTION

Col. New Apportions Seats at Republican Gathering. (By Associated Press to the Coos Bay Times.)

CHICAGO, May 20.—Colonel Harry S. New, chairman of the committee on arrangements for the republican national convention to whom the committee left the matter of selection of temporary chairman, said today that he is too busy with other things to consider the selection of the temporary chairman now.

The present schedule calls for a division of the 11,172 seats as follows: Delegates, 1078; extra seat for each delegate, 1078; newspapermen, 500; Chicago committee, 2000; remaining for visitors, 5438.
