FORBIDDEN BY LAW

THERE has been much talk about the freak laws of Oregon, but there are other states with queer legislative enactments.

A Kansas City paper recently compiled a list of trivial enactments on the statute books of Kansas. Some of them and the penalties they impose are as follows:

- To fall to clean a henhouse once every twenty-four hours, \$25 fine.
- To sell a dime novel with an account of crime, \$100 fine.
- To keep tame pigeons, \$15.
- To talk back to a policeman, \$100.
- To "sic" one dog on another, \$100.
- To hitch a horse to a weight weighing less than thirty pounds, \$25.
- To throw rice at newly wed couples, \$100.
- To whittle on a fence, \$25.
- To spit a wad of gum in a street car, \$25.
- To have a barbed-wire fence around your premises, \$25.
- To carry a stone out of another man's yard, \$50.
- To throw a banana peeling into Coak Creek, \$100.
- To watch a corn doctor work his jaw on the street, \$50.

NAVAL MILITIA OFFICER HERE

Lieut. Blomberg, senior officer of the Oregon Naval Militia, arrived here from Portland yesterday to inspect the Coos Bay and Bandon divisions of the organization. It was expected to have most of the local members turn out and welcome him when the breakwater arrived, but owing to the vessel being later than was expected, not many of them were out the dock to greet him.

Yesterday Capt. Macgenn assembled as many of the members of the local divisions as possible and Lieut. Blomberg gave them a talk on the affairs of the organization. He stated that the annual cruise will be held from June 16 to June 26 and the Oregon Naval Militia will go on the U. S. S. Maryland, one of the finest vessels in the navy. She carries about 700 men and the Oregon Militia will work alongside the regulars and will get most excellent training. It is planned to have the Maryland come down the coast and have a tug take the Coos Bay and Bandon militiamen who go on the cruise out to her. She will then proceed to Puget Sound, where she will join the Moorehead, carrying the California Naval Militia, and the Pennsylvania, carrying the Washington Naval Militia. The three vessels will then proceed to sea for target practice.

Lieut. Blomberg is anxious to recruit the Coos Bay divisions up to their former strength. He hopes to straighten the misunderstanding of a year ago which caused the members to lose interest in it. He says that if the divisions are recruited again, the Navy Department will furnish all the equipment necessary. The whole boat and cutter which were received this week were the first of the equipment to be furnished. Unless she is able to recruit them and get them working better than they did for a while, he may disband the organization, but he is very desirous that this shall not be the case. Since Capt. Macgenn assumed command of the local divisions he has been gradually getting them back in shape, but the work has been difficult.

Today Lieut. Blomberg went to Bandon and will return tomorrow. Tuesday evening, another meeting of the Coos Bay divisions will be held. Lieut. Blomberg is accompanied by his wife on the trip.
