

BREAK RECORDS AT CORVALLIS

High School Athletes Made New Marks in Field Meet There Saturday.

Carl Larson, Sidney Clarke and Guy Stutsman, who represented the Marshfield High School in the high school field meet at Corvallis last Saturday are expected home tomorrow. Nothing has been heard from them except the brief dispatch printed in The Times last Saturday.

Larson was second in the 880 yard dash, the best time being 2:06 3-5.

In the high jump in which Sidney Clarke was fourth, the record established was five feet, nine and one quarter inches.

Concerning the meet, a Corvallis dispatch says: "In the final events of the sixth annual interscholastic track meet run off at Oregon Agricultural College Athletic Field Saturday, new state records were set in the pole-vault, discus and hammer events, while Woodworth of Lincoln, broke the Northwest high school record in the high jump by clearing the bar at five feet, nine and one-fourth inches."

"The Columbia University team of Portland, scoring 33 points, carried off every cup offered at the meet, winning the President Kerr cup for the team with the highest number of points, also the Oregon Agricultural College relay cup and individual honor cup which went to Gorecky, winner of ten of Columbia's 33 points.

"La Grande High School stood second with a total of 17 points and third place went to Pendleton with 11 points.

"Fifteen other schools, having representatives who won places in the final events, are Baker, Salem and Vancouver, 9 points; Lincoln High School, Portland and Corvallis, 3; Athena, Dayton and Eugene, 5; Grass Valley and Marshfield 3; Junction City, 2; Lafayette, Wallowa County, Wallowa and Newburg, 1.

WELLANDER HAS BEEN APPOINTED

Yaquina Life-Saving Man Is Chosen Superintendent for Pacific Coast.

Washington dispatches announce that Capt. Wellander, of the Yaquina Bay Life Saving Station has been appointed superintendent of the service on the Pacific coast, succeeding the late Supt. Varney, a former Coos Bay man. The appointment is of considerable interest on the Bay because many here were anxious to see Capt. Norman Nelson, former keeper of the Coos Bay Life Saving Station, but now keeper of the Golden Gate station, appointed. Capt. Wellander recently visited Coos Bay, having come here to investigate the requests for moving the local station to a point nearer the bar.

Concerning the appointment, a Washington dispatch says: Otto Wellander, keeper of the Yaquina Bay Life Saving Station at Newport, Ore., has been promoted to be superintendent of the lifesaving division of the Pacific coast, embracing all stations in California, Washington, Oregon and Alaska. The promotion is the result of a competitive examination held at San Francisco recently, participated in by most of the keepers of the Pacific coast stations. Wellander made the highest average and captured the plum. As keeper at Yaquina Bay his salary is \$1000 annually. The new position pays \$2200 annually.

Supt. Wellander will take charge of the San Francisco headquarters within a few days, succeeding the late Supt. Varney.

Wellander has been in the lifesaving service nearly 20 years and has made an excellent record, according to high officials of the service in Washington. He is a native of England, but has been naturalized in this country and is 40 years old.

I. Kimball, superintendent of the lifesaving service, said that Wellander, besides his excellent and long record in the service, has many times distinguished himself by heroic rescues from wrecked ships on the Pacific coast.

"There is no better or more able man than Wellander in the whole service," declared Kimball.

FINE CONCERT IN NORTH BEND

New Band Renders Excellent Program to Large Audience Saturday Night.

The people of North Bend were most agreeably surprised Saturday evening when the North Bend Concert Band, under the direction of Mr. Chas. Kaiser, gave its first concert. The program was rendered at the Eckhoff Hall at 8:30. The concert of some seven numbers was followed by a social dance lasting until 12 o'clock.

The program as played contained the following classic and popular numbers: March Diamond S Overture, Bridal Rose (Lavelle) (a) Love's Old Sweet Song... Molloy (b) Those Endearing Charms... Serenade Moonlight (Moret) Fest March Tannhauser (Wagner) Waltz Mein Thuringen (Kiesler) Caprice Dancing Sunbeams (Greenwald) Patrol Blue and Grey (Dolby)

The Fest March from Tannhauser and the Blue and Grey, which were both excellently rendered, brought down a heavy encore. The North Bend Concert Band was reorganized last January from the members of the old North Bend Band which had such a reputation for good music some six years ago before it disbanded. Mr. Charles Kaiser, the director, has been quietly but thoroughly and skillfully rehearsing the band three evenings every week for the last five months and their first appearance marks them as a city band of the first rank; the program would indicate as much.

As a director and virtuoso musician Mr. Kaiser needs no word of praise beyond the facts that he enjoyed the reputation of being the best baritone player in the United States army at the time of his service at San Juan in the Spanish-American War, and is now one of the best-known musicians on the Pacific coast.

The band brought out almost everyone in North Bend as this, with the exception of the benefit concert given so successfully by the Coos Bay Concert Band, was the first band concert North Bend has had in six or seven years. The dance given after the concert packed the large hall and every one concurred with his neighbor in the statement that band music was a most delightful innovation to the young people of North Bend who dance.

This concert was so much above the expectations of the citizens of North Bend who are supporting it that continued band concerts and dances are eagerly anticipated.
