HE cries against the tensity of modern life are many. People are continually deploring the fate that keeps them laboring when there are so many pleasant things they would prefer to do. But the rewards and solaces of labor are manifold. A writer in Harpers Weekly observes that it is the obligation to work that in adult years speeds the time and sends the years rolling behind us. And it is true that the tragedy of many a life begen at the moment when work became an impossibility.

More than this, work is a means of expression. We tell our plans to our friends. We talk sympatheticatly of beliefs and standards, but we ogr friends or others until we have constallized our ideas by some form of effort and attainment. It is work that makes us akin, after all. We believe in a man who does things. He gains faith in himself by the reanlts of his effort and keeps sane and efficient by continued applica-

It is the concreteness of work that sfeadles the mind and the conscience. The mere act of labor tends to sys-tematize thought and sharpen con-dction. Psychologists tell us much detion. Psychologists tell us much of the corelation of physical and mental processes, and whether one works with hands or brain, his personality becomes moided and frengthened by the responsibility and exactions of his task.

To be most satisfactory in its effects work should be self-directed,

not the mere drudgery of the slave though this latter has its whole-armely redeeming possibilities. But the task that originates in the mind of the worker, is a part of his faith and hope and devotion, is a means for the expression of human personality in terms of life.

The work that is thus original and the result of spontaneous effort is seldom dull or deadening in its effects. It represents something peculiarly individual and gives meaning as well as stability to existence.

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TO COOS BAY

Engineer Hoey Enthuses Over Country Along Line From Eugene Here.

The Eugene Guard says: "The opening of the new railroad from Eugene to Marshfield will give access to a country of enormous wealth and unsurpassed beauty," said H. P. Hoey, chief construction engineer of the Southern Pacific company's lines of Western Oregon and Northern California, who with W. R. Fortaine, engineer in charge, has just returned from a trip over the route of the road from Eugene to Marshfield. Mr. Hoey says that the timber resources of the country are vast ,and the agricultural possibil-ities splendid. The harbor at Marsh-field is magnificent and that city surprised him by its size and enterprise.

"I have never traveled through a more beautiful piece of country in my work of traversing right-of-way," said Mr. Hoey. "The road runs along the edge of a chain of lakes nestling at the foot of the coast range, and it will be truly a scenic route. Two of these lakes are each ten miles long, and one is five miles long, and there are a number of smaller ones. The banks are heavily timbered and the view from the road will be delightful. These lakes and the surrounding country will constitute a territory that will be a paradise for the hunter and fisherman, and the lakes will certainly be utilized as summer resorts when the road is fin-
