HOO-HOO CONCATENATION

Class of Kittens to be Initiated Here Friday Evening.

The Breakwater will sail tomorrow from Portland for Coos Bay.

The Advance and Elizabeth sailed yesterday from Bandon for San Francisco.

Eleven steam oil burning steamers are now being freed for the trade of this coast.

The Excelsior sailed yesterday with a cargo of lumber from the Smith mill for San Francisco.

The schooner Omega is en route here from San Francisco and the Advent is also due from San Pedro soon.

George Forty has chartered George Wilson's launch, the Wanderer, for his annual sealion hunt near Port Orford.

Admiral Uriel Sebree, U. S. N., retired, is visiting in San Francisco. He was the first lighthouse inspector for this district.

The world's largest drydock has been completed at Belfast, Ireland. It is 886 feet long and 100 feet wide. All told it was eight years in building.

The A. M. Simpson, the new steam schooner of the Simpson Lumber company, returned last night from her first trip to San Pedro. She had a good trip up the coast and will load for San Francisco. No passengers came up on her.

A majority of the big ocean going vessels now building in Europe, especially those being constructed in Sweden and Norway are to be of the internal combustion type. Looks like the coal and oil burners must go with the sailing ships.

After July 1, each passenger vessel coming under the United States wireless ship act will be compelled to carry an auxiliary wireless set not dependent upon the vessel's dynamo, engine or storage battery plants of any kind. The auxiliary battery must be located in the wireless room of the vessel on the upper deck.

The Osprey, which arrived in from Rogue River today, was found to have sprung a leak and will be taken to the North Bend shipyards for repairs. She will take out a big cargo of brick, cement and other building material for the Macleay estate of Portland, the new owners of the Hume properties on Rogue River.

SCENIC ROUTE TO COOS BAY

Engineer Hoey Enthuses Over Country Along Line From Eugene Here.

The Eugene Guard says: "The opening of the new railroad from Eugene to Marshfield will give access to a country of enormous wealth and unsurpassed beauty," said H. P. Hoey, chief construction engineer of the Southern Pacific company's lines of Western Oregon and Northern California, who with W. R. Fontaine, engineer in charge, has just returned from a trip over the route of the road from Eugene to Marshfield.

Mr. Hoey says that the timber resources of the country are vast and the agricultural possibilities splendid. The harbor at Marshfield is magnificent and that city surprised him by its size and enterprise.

"I have never traveled through a more beautiful piece of country in my work of traversing right-of-way," said Mr. Hoey. "The road runs along the edge of a chain of lakes nestling at the foot of the coast range, and it will be truly a scenic route. Two of these lakes are each ten miles long, and one is five miles long, and there are a number of smaller ones. The banks are heavily timbered and the view from the road will be delightful. These lakes and the surrounding country will constitute a territory that will be a paradise for the hunter and fisherman, and the lakes will certainly be utilized as summer resorts when the road is finished."

Heavy Construction.

"The work from an engineering point of view will be heavy and interesting. Several large bridges and a number of smaller ones will have to be built, as the track will cross the Siuslaw, the Umpqua, an arm of Coos Bay and many minor streams. I made the trip in order to get a general outline of the country so that I could proceed at once when I should receive the word to begin. I have not personally received word from the head office yet.
