CAST OF SENIOR PLAY

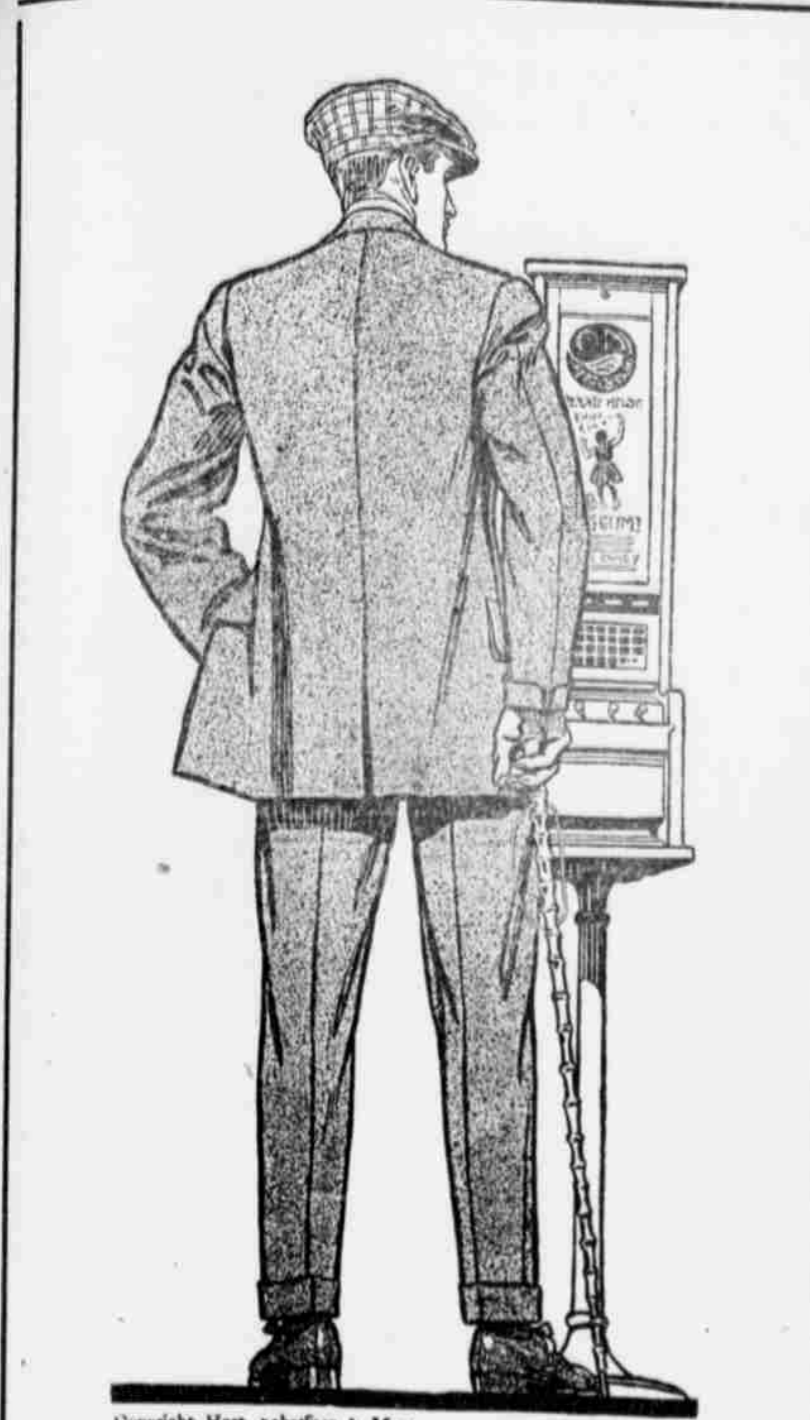
Entertainment Will Be Given Tomorrow Night by the Seniors.
