The recital, which was given last evening in the College Auditorium, was an unqualified success in every sense of the word. The program was rendered by Miss Edna Larson, of Marshfield, Oregon, pupil of Mr. Gjerdrum, assisted by Miss Virginia Lawson, pupil of Mrs. Adams.

The opening number, which was the second movement of Scharwenka Fourth Concerto, was given by Miss Larson and Mr. Gjerdrum. Miss Larson's playing was marked by excellent technique and much ease of manner. Special attention might be made of the brilliant cadenza and smooth octave passages in this number. Mr. Gjerdrum's work was notably fine. Her second offering, a group of four, consisted of "Valse Triste" by the Finnish composer, Sibelius, "Legende," Signe Lund Skabo, "Rhapsodie in G Minor," Brahms. These were all played with breadth of style and careful attention to details. "Valse Triste," with its dramatic climaxes, was notably good and Miss Larson's interpretation of the "Gavotte," was thought by many to be her best number. These novelties were characterized by a variety of contrasting themes and were greatly enjoyed. Her playing of Schubert's "Impromptu, op. 90, No. 2," was marked by excellent technique, the florid passages being given with admirable smoothness. The closing number, McDowell's "Polonaise, op. 46" was given with breadth and understanding, all of which was appreciated by an enthusiastic audience.
