PLAN TO END LONDON STRIKE

Labor Trouble Likely to Be Submitted to Board of Trade for Arbitration.

LONDON, May 29—The situation in the London dock strike is unchanged today. The leaders of the strike now say the trouble will soon be brought to an end as the men express themselves satisfied with the report of Sir Edward Clark who after a close inquiry found the trouble was due mainly to a failure to carry out a clause in the existing agreement between the employers and the men providing that the differences be referred to the Board of Trade for a decision.

DECLARES ROOSEVELT WILL WIN ON THE FIRST BALLOT

INVESTIGATE JAPANESE DEAL

Alleged Negotiations at Magdalena Bay Will Be Probed By the Senate.

WASHINGTON, May 29—Negotiations of Japanese interests for land on Magdalena Bay, Mexico, were referred by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to a subcommittee for investigation to determine if any acquisitions of territory or concessions there encroached on the Monroe doctrine.

STREET WORK IN NORTH BEND

Mayor Simpson Outlines Improvements That Will Cost About \$200,000.

At a meeting of the North Bend city council last evening, a letter from Mayor Simpson, who left a few days ago for San Francisco, urging many street improvements there, was taken up and discussed.

The improvements recommended in Mayor Simpson's letter include the following streets:

Union from Washington to Lincoln Square. Estimated cost \$15,810.80.

Washington from Union to Sherman.

Sheridan from Virginia to California.

Sheridan from California to north line of platted portion of town.

Montana from Sheridan to Pony Inlet bridge. Estimated cost, \$9,931.25.

Two projects on Sherman avenue. One for improving it from California to Florida which would cost \$39,022.60 if done by a hydraulic dredge or \$70,060.68 if done by team.

The second project included another block of grading, continuing the street from Florida to the Ball Park, which would mean an additional cost of \$705.75 if done by dredge or \$1270.26 if done by team.

Mayor Simpson also recommended that hard paving be laid on Sherman avenue after it is graded.

The idea is that if the Southern Pacific passenger depot is located on Sheridan avenue between California and the T. W. Rennie home, as some now expect, and the freight depot is located at Sheridan between California and Connecticut, it is very essential that easy grades on the streets approaching them be provided.

The cost of the projected improvements, it is estimated, will be in the neighborhood of \$200,000. Owing to so much grading being necessary and the fact that the dirt can be sluiced down the mud flat near the Bay, Mayor Simpson believes that hydraulic power should be utilized.

This would probably reduce the cost of grading about one half, it being estimated that hydraulic power should remove the dirt from Sherman avenue for about ten cents per cubic yard while it would cost about eighteen cents per cubic yard by the old method.

The change in grades will raise havoc with many of the residences along the street, cuts of ten, fifteen and even as high as eighteen feet being made. This will mean a considerable additional expense to the property owners aside from the cost of improving the streets.

Senator Dixon Says He Will Have Over 600 Delegates In Convention.

CLAIMS OVER 30 OF NEW YORK DELEGATION

Congressman McKinley Maintains Taft Will Win—Up to Committee.

WASHINGTON, May 29—Senator Dixon, campaign manager for Col. Roosevelt, returned to Washington from New York today and made the prediction that Roosevelt will have more than six hundred delegates on the first ballot in the Chicago convention exclusive of contested delegates.

Included in this number he said would be more than thirty from New York.

Taft's manager, Congressman McKinley of Illinois, asserted that the President's actual strength at present is 574 delegates, exclusive of delegates-at-large in Ohio and Texas. He emphatically predicted the nomination of Taft for president on the first ballot.

Up to Committee Now. Friends of President Taft admitted today that everything now depends on the republican National committee. They are confident, they said, that the committee will be for Taft.

Talk of defections among southern delegates pledged or instructed for Taft was revived today, but Taft's political advisors professed to believe the delegates would stick to him.

It was positively stated that the President's name will be presented to the convention, no matter what happens. This bears out the statements Taft made months ago that "Nothing but death" would keep him out of the fight. Taft is interested now particularly in the platform. It is said, and in the selection of a man to present his name to the convention.

TO ELECT NEW DIRECTORS

School Politics Beginning to Liven Up In Marshfield and North Bend.

School politics in North Bend and Marshfield are beginning to liven up a bit, a director having to be elected at each place.

In Marshfield the term of M. C. Horton will expire. Mr. Horton is now in the East and although many of his friends have been urging that he accept the position again, it is understood that he does not feel that his present plans will enable him to do so.

Interests away from the Bay will require much of his time and prevent him from giving the time to the position that he has in the past. A. H. Powers is understood to be his choice for the place and it is likely that Mr. Powers will accept the position. No other candidates have been suggested so far.

In North Bend, the term of F. W. Stevens expires and he will not be a candidate for the place. The election will be held June 17. Mrs. Herbert Armstrong was suggested by many for the place but she is unable to accept the position, although she appreciates the honor.

Owen Moore, a well-known North Bend man, has been brought out for the place by the North Bend Mothers and Teachers' Club, although he has not formally announced that he will accept. The following statement was made today by the Mothers and Teachers' Club about the matter:

"At a recent meeting of the Mothers and Teachers' Club in North Bend called for the special purpose of recommending someone to succeed Mr. Stevens on the School Board, more than two hours' deliberation by the members of the club selected the name of Mr. Owen Moore, as a man name of sterling character, educational ability and time to devote to the interests of the schools. From so many good names suggested it was difficult to make a decision; but Mr. Moore seemed to be the one that would have more time to devote to school interests along with the other necessary qualifications."
