**Oppose Single Tax.**—Dr. E. Mungus is circulating petitions here opposing the single tax measure which it is proposed to submit to the voters of Oregon at the coming election. The petitions are being generously signed.

**New Saloon.**—Jas. McCutcheon was in from Bunker Hill yesterday completing arrangements to open the second saloon in the Southern Pacific mining town. C. A. McAdams runs the one now being operated there.

**Extend Lines.**—The Coos Bay Home Telephone Co. is making an eight-line extension from Bunker Hill to the Shinglehouse Slough section, and is also arranging to string a new sixty-line cable between Marshfield and Bunker Hill.

**Commencement Tonight.**—The regular commencement exercises of the Marshfield High School will be held at the high school building this evening. President P. L. Campbell, of Oregon University, will deliver the principal address. He will arrive this afternoon via Myrtle Point and Coquille. The diplomas will be presented the class tonight.

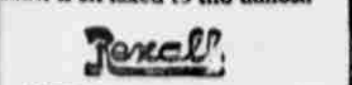
