Buy's Ranch—Wm. Pugh and Mr. Gibbs of North Inlet were Marshfield visitors today. Mr. Gibbs has practically closed negotiations for the purchase of one-half of the McFarlin cranberry ranch, paying \$3,000 for it.

Mass Earlier—Rev. Father Munro announces that mass will be celebrated in North Bend next Sunday at 7:30 and in Marshfield at 8:45. He has received a letter from Archbishop Christie stating that he will visit the Bay in July but he does not give the exact date.

Steel Knife Case—A wall show case containing about \$20 worth of cutlery was stolen from in front of the Gunnery last evening. The case was worth about \$10. Yesterday, Jay Tower of the Gunnery forgot to take the case in when he closed the store. It was usually left out just during the day time.

Lumbermen Here—Miles Standish and son, A. M. Standish, and H. B. Hickey of the Standish-Hickey Lumber company arrived here today from San Francisco via Coquille. They own a large tract of lumber along

the Coquille and are also interested in the North Bend Lumber company's mill. They have been figuring on enlarging the mill for some time but nothing definite has been done about it yet.

Consider New Plan—The Marshfield Aerie of Eagles is considering a plan to buy a site at Eastside for a home to be built for caring for the widows, orphans or sick members of the order. Nothing definite has been done about it yet but C. C. Going, Dr. Straw and Wm. Holland as a special committee have been investigating the matter.

Raises Fine Potatoes—Jacob Matson today was exhibiting some fine new potatoes which he raised this year on the hill made by the Dredge Oregon on the North Front street flat last winter. Generally it has been considered that the shells and silt would not produce anything the first year until the silt had been washed off by the rains but Mr. Matson has demonstrated that fallacy of this. He had potatoes large enough to use over a week ago.

Plan Big Shoot—Owing to the bad roads which made the proposed auto trip to Bandon impractical, the Marshfield Gun Club yesterday called off its trip to the city by the sea. They will go there later. In the afternoon, a large number participated in a shoot on the Marshfield grounds and some food scores were made. The club is now planning for a big shoot to be held here July 3 and 4 when it is expected that North Bend, Bandon and Coquille will participate. Sec. Ekblad hopes to get about \$100 to be offered in prizes besides some trophies.

S. P. TO BUILD ASTORIA LINE

Articles Are Filed for Portland, Nehalem & Seacoast Railway.
SALEM, Ore., May 31.—Articles of incorporation were filed here for the way company, and state that the company intends to build a road from Portland to Astoria. The incorporators are J. A. Jackson, C. E. Wightman and W. O. McCarthy. The capital stock is \$750,000. Portland is the principal place of business.

In addition to building and operating railroad, telegraph, telephone and power lines, the incorporation articles include all rights and privileges usually granted the steamboat company. The line to Astoria is to be built on the Oregon side, through Washington, Columbia and Clatsop counties. It is presumed here that the road will be part of the Southern Pacific system.
