S. P. TO BUILD ASTORIA LINE Articles Are Filed for Portland, Ne-

halem & Seacoast Railway. SALEM, Ore., May 31.—Articles of incorporation were filed here for the

way company, and state that the com-pany intends to build a road from Portland to Astoria. The incorpora-tors are J. A. Jackson, C. E. Wight-man and W. O. McCarthy. The capi-tal stock is \$750,000. Portland is the principal place of business.
In addition to building and operat

ing railroad, telegraph, telephone and power lines, the incorporation articles include all rights and privileges usu-ally granted the steamboat company.

The line to Astoria is to be built on the Oregon side, through Washington, Columbia and Clatsop counties. It is presumed here that the road will be part of the Southern Pacific system
