

## PATRIOTISM IS STILL ARDENT

Pres't Campbell Says Americans of Today Are As Loyal As Ever.

After paying high tribute to the patriotism of the Americans in the crisis that had confronted their country, President P. L. Campbell in his able address at the Memorial Day exercises at the Masonic Opera House yesterday declared that the people of today are of the same stock and just as patriotic. However, he declared that the social unrest should not be ignored but should be dealt with promptly and settled by the education of the masses and the inspiring of them with more lofty ideals.

He said that the few instances recently in which the flag had been desecrated did not signify that American citizens of today were less loyal than were their forefathers. He said that such events are to be deplored but that he believed that just as ardent patriotism permeates the American people today as in bygone times. He pointed out that the Spanish American war exemplified this—that when it was seen that the country needed the aid of its citizens, there was prompt response from city and country, from factory and from farm.

His declaration that the disrespect shown the flag by certain individuals or organizations was due to lack of true education and proper ideals,—the inspiration that leads true American citizens to offer their lives for its defense—brought forth hearty applause from the audience.

In the course of his address, President Campbell commended Judge Hanford, who took away the naturalization papers of a Seattle man who insulted the flag. He said that such indignities must not be tolerated for there was room for but one flag in this country and that the people must be taught that free speech was not a license for anarchy or attacks on "Old Glory." The latter was roundly applauded, especially by the veterans in the audience.

Mr. Campbell dealt at length on different phases of education as the cure for social unrest. He said that the grievances or fancied wrongs of the people were not to be ignored but should be considered carefully and dealt with promptly lest they smolder on until they broke out in revolution. As a guard in the time of crisis, he felt that American patriotism could be relied upon but the averting of the severe test of the nation was something to be accomplished if possible. In closing, he paid a beautiful tribute to the nation's honored dead.

The Memorial Day services were largely attended, the Masonic Opera House being filled to overflowing. S. B. Cathcart, commander of Baker Post, G. A. R., presided and introduced President Campbell.

Chas. Van Zile won much applause by his delivery of Lincoln's "Gettysburg Address."

Recitations by Miss Agnes Sanquist and Miss Harriet Hanson were also loudly applauded.

An especially pretty and pleasing feature of the program were songs by a score of little pupils of the Marshfield schools under the direction of Mrs. P. M. Wilbur.

Several selections were rendered by the Golden West quartette composed of Messrs. C. S. Dodge, C. D. Lash, J. B. Tower and Chas. Stauff.

The exercises were opened with a prayer by the Rev. H. L. Rutledge.

The Coos Bay Concert Band which led the parade to the Masonic Opera House also rendered a number of selections.

**BILL PASSES SENATE**  
Final Vote Taken on Amended Tariff Measure.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 31.—The House steel and iron tariff revision bill passed the Senate yesterday by a vote of 35 to 22. The repeal of the Canadian reciprocity law places a universal duty of \$2 a ton on print paper and cuts the duty on pig-iron and ferro-silicon. The bill now goes to conference with the House.

## BETTER STAGE SERVICE NOW

Summer Schedule Between Roseburg and Marshfield Effective Tomorrow.

Beginning tomorrow morning, the Roseburg-Coos Bay stage will be placed on the summer schedule, leaving each end of the line at 6 o'clock in the morning and arriving at the destination the same evening.

Manager Barnard of the stage line has everything in readiness and expects that considerably better time will be made over the road this year than during previous seasons.

The old Coos Bay wagon road is in much better condition than heretofore as a result of extensive improvements made during the past few months.

The stage leaving here in the morning will connect with the evening train for Portland at Roseburg.

Otto Schetter, the local agent of the stage, has provided for the sale of tickets at Hilmyer's cigar stand as well as at his own office at 129 Market avenue.

The change in the stage service will also mean a change in the Roseburg-Coos Bay mail service to the summer schedule.

## WILL DISCUSS FOURTH PLANS

Meeting at Chamber of Commerce Tonight to Arrange for Celebration.

**RAISE LARGE SUM**  
At a late hour this afternoon, Messrs. Rotnor and Mendel had secured \$1650 in subscriptions for the Fourth of July Celebration.

Another meeting of business men and others interested in the Fourth of July celebration will be held at the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce this evening to perfect plans for it. A. J. Mendel and George Rotnor, the soliciting committee, will make a report on the subscriptions for the celebration.

It is expected that most of the sub-committee will be able to present an outline of their plans for their share of the entertainment this evening and that the funds will be apportioned for prize and expense money.

Secretary John Motley has been advised by F. E. Hague that he will not be able to serve on the general sports committee owing to being in poor health. E. K. Jones has also notified Mr. Motley that he cannot take charge of the decorations because he expects to spend the latter part of June and the early part of July in California.

These vacancies will probably be filled tonight.

F. P. Norton has made tentative plans for the horse racing program for July 2 and 3 and expects that a number of outside horses will be attracted by the purses to be hung up. He is also figuring on having a motorcycle race as an additional feature.

F. E. Wilson, who has charge of the parade and music, is figuring on having the North Bend band here for at least one day of the celebration.

**WORK ON DOYLE PROJECT**  
Claim Fifteen Miles of Road Has Been Located.

The Roseburg Review says: "Two rainy days this week have kept the engineering force of the Oregon & Southern Railway Co. away from their field work. They have been busy, however, in the engineer's offices in the Perkins building, which quarters were recently secured in addition to the company's office headquarters there. The first 15 miles of road are now pretty definitely located and Messrs. Doyle and Farren report an excellent grade secured. A tentative examination is also being made of a route between Oakland and Coos Bay, as that is generally known to be an even shorter route than from Roseburg. Very heavy expense of construction through the Coos river mountains may be a deterrent feature there, however. Messrs. Doyle and Farren say that by July 1st they expect to have matters advanced so as to announce actual construction on the first section of 15 miles out of Roseburg. Similar construction may also be made on the Coos Bay end of the line this year, so they say. They are working away steadily in their offices and appear optimistic and sanguine of the final results of their efforts in building this proposed railroad."
